OTTAWA, June 26 .- The new tariff which was put into operation last November, has resulted in a reduction of the rate of duty. This is shown by comparision of the amount of duty collected with the value of the imports for the six months period from De cember to May inclusive. The average rate of duty on all the imports entering Canada was 15.81 per cent., while under the old tariff, the rate for the corresponding six months of the year before was 16.31. On dutiable goods alone, the rate for the six months this year was 26.74 per cent., and the year before 27.05 per cent. The British preference which averaged 21.82 per cent. under the old tariff averages 21.15 per cent. duty under the new

"The United States Rubber Co.," said Mr. Stehens, "has not bought a share of stock in the Canadian concern and has not a cent's worth of interest in it. The Canadian Consolidated Rubber Com pany stands where it has been. There no truth whatever in the story of its absorption.

OTTAWA, June 25-The total steamship subsidies for the nine months end-ed March 31 last was \$1,128,876, com-pared with \$1,227,560 for the previous twelve months.

The different services to Great Britain cost \$460,666, and the services to France, China, Japan, Australia, South Africa, Mexico, New Zealand, West Indies, South America, San Francisco and Alaska, cost \$517,905. The mail contract to Britain \$373,916 for the nine months, as compared with \$282,390 for the twelve nonths previous.

The amount of bounty paid out on iron and steel for the nine months was \$1,299,801; petroleum, \$266,533; binder twine, \$12,595, and lead, \$1,994.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 25-The corporation of Halifax is up against the money market. The city advertised for loans aggregating \$740,000 at four per cent., to cover the cost of various civic work. The tenders were to be in today, but only one covrs the cost of various civic works. The aldermen then decided to offer the four per cent., loan at ninety-five, in the hope of attracting investors, and they also cut down the amount of their requirements by half,
