Reports Presence of Much Ice, Especially in White Bay.—Schooners Held Up.

The Bowring coaster Prospero, Capt. A. Kean, returned from the northward yesterday, bringing the following passengers: Messrs. Biles, G. H. Pearce, H. Capt. Kean informs us that White Bay is still blocked with ice. The Prospero was jammed there for three hours and during that time drifted ten miles. The ice now in White Bay is almost certain to drift in Green Bay unless there are some heavy offshore winds. Schooners are held up on all sides by ice.

The coaster had to skip several harbors, as the barrier was so heavy she could not enter.
