Property transfers in Brantford during the month of February show-ed an appreciable increase in number as compared with February a year ago. Last month there were 51 transfers, as compared with 40 a year ago. The assessment department yesterday received the returns from the Registry Office in order to make the necessary changes on the assessment ooks. The local assessors are beginning to encounter the same diffiulties as other civic assessors complain of, namely the practice of parties to real estate deals having the same registered at the nominal purchase price of \$1. This, of course is in order to keep the price secretbetween the parties and to prevent the assessors from getting a line on the value as shown in an actual pur-

The Courier was informed by local dealer that there were not over 50 vacant houses in the city.
