## REPRESENTATION.

As will be noted elsewhere in these columns, the petition from the citizens of the Yukon territory, asking for representation, has been received in parliament, and brought directly to the notice of the members. In all probability, the petition will meet the same fate that has been accorded to similar documents from the people of the Yukon which have previously gone down to Ottawa. Members of parliament are never in a hurry when dealing with Yukon matters, except when an opportunity is presented to them to get in on a choice concession or something equally good. In such an emergency, they seem to be able to move with a very considerable degree of alacrity. An opening wedge has been placed, however, which may, in time, be driven in so deeply that all obstructions will be turned aside and consideration given to the Yukon territory, such as the conditions of the country warrant. Repre sentation in parliament is as essential as representation in the Yukon council; and there has as yet been no legitimate reason advanced why both should not be granted.
