So far the price has been nearly prohibitive to the ordinary prospector. It is a well-known fact that wealthy men, unless of an adverturous turn of mind, will not incur the risks and hardships attendant upon those that push on into unexplored wildernesses and over rugged mountains in search of new placer fields and mineral bear, ing lodes. The general run of these adventurous spirits are not endowed with an overplus of ready funds, therefore do not and cannot afford to pay 75 or 80 cents a pound for powder to open up and develop a mineral vein that they may have discovered. We all know that the future of this country depends largely on the opening up of mineral bearing rock, and therefore the price of powder should be reduced to bring it within reach of the prospector. I would suggest that the Dominion government interest itself in the matter and put up a plant within easy reach of Dawson and manufacture the powder here and furnish it to miners and prospectors at as near cost of manufacture as possible. The ingredients could be shipped in without risk and at the cost of ordinary freight. My opinion is that if this
