**THE INVASION HAS BEGUN.**

Six Hundred United States Marines at Guantanamo.

A Long and Heavy Battle Between the Troops and the Spanish—Four Americans Killed and One Wounded—How the Engagement was Conducted by the Cuban-Spaniards, and How the Attack was Met by the U. S. Soldiers.

On board the Associated Press dispatch boat, off Guantanamo, Sunday, June 13, via Melo St. Nicholas, Hayti, June 12, (8 p.m.)—Local. Col. R. W. Huntington's battalion of marines, landed from the transport Panther on Friday and encountered the hill guard, the abandoned cable station at the entrance to the harbor.

A bush attack by Spanish guerillas and regulars since 8 o'clock Saturday morning. The lights were almost continuous for 18 hours, until 6 o'clock this morning, when reinforcements were landed from the transport Panther.

Four Americans were killed and one was wounded. The advance platoons under Lieut. Neville and Shaw are unaccounted for.

An Assistant Surgeon Killed.

Among the killed in the Assistant Surgeon John Blair Gibbs, son of Major Gibbs of the regular army, who fell in the Cuban engagement. His home was in the Outer Westchester, New York.
