SALARY QUESTION.

The Water Commissioners Have a Debate on it.

Inspector O'Meara Gets an Increase—The Fire Brigade Used by Way of Comparison—General Business.

At a meeting of the water commissioners last night there were present: Chairman Bray, Commissioner Sheldon, Mayor Smith, Secretary Weir and Supt. Jones.

The following accounts were presented and passed:—O. B. Hulin \$11.65, Central Foundry Co. \$30.50, Thompson Meter Co. \$55.44, Bell Telephone Co. \$10, Newton Eberts \$3, Park Bros. \$37.44, McKenough & Trotter \$20.00, C. W. Shipman \$19.27, City Treasurer Fleming was on application granted a rebate of \$4 on water rate.

G. G. Martin, solicitor, wrote on behalf of H. J. Kogelchitz asking \$25 damages for injury to property by the bursting of the sedimentation basin.

Wm. A. Roberts, Taylor avenue, wrote asking \$20 damages for same accident.

The report of Supt. Jones on the accident and damage done was submitted.

Supt. Jones reported the damage to Mr. Kogelchitz as nil, his land being uninjured and he being supplied with a tile drain.

The damage to Mr. Roberts' well was recommended to be settled by the commissioners.

On the suggestion of the chairman it was decided to submit the matter to the board's solicitor.

An application from J. H. Bogart for extension was referred to superintendent.

It was decided to postpone the building of a coal shed and tool house until next year.

W. R. Baxter was given the contract for printing 3,000 notice cards for \$4, he being the lowest tenderer.

THE SALARY QUESTION.

An application was received from Michael O'Meara for an increase in salary to \$50 a month.

The Mayor did not believe in raising any salaries in the middle of the year. Mr. O'Meara was now getting \$45 a month, which was good salary for the city.

The chairman—Well, I favor the raise because the man deserves it. He is working all the time, day and sometimes night. Now there's firemen getting \$45 a month and O'Meara does more in a day than they do in a month.

Mr. Sheldon also favored the increase. He believed O'Meara was one of the best and most faithful servants in the employ of the corporation. Besides his pay was fixed before his work had been greatly increased. Two hundred services had been put in the last two years alone.

The Mayor said he could not favor the proposed increase. I opposed the raising in the fire hall and I must here.

The chairman—But you raised them all the same. You've got a miserable fire department for all that but then I suppose the council's to blame for that.

The Mayor—You sat at the council once? The Chairman—Yes, if I had my way the whole shooting match would be turned out.

The Mayor—Well, I agree with you about the fire department and it's one of the highest paid in the province.

Mr. Sheldon moved the increase which carried, the Mayor dissenting.

His Worship, smiling—Now, I suppose I'll be blamed for keeping down working-men's wages.

Mr. Sheldon—Well, I'm sorry we differed. It's the first time a difference has occurred since we sat together at the board. You'd better second the motion yet, Mr. Mayor.

His Worship—No, I cannot, on principle.
