**CANADA'S GREYNA GREEN.**

Windsor's former big record for  
marriages has been beaten out of sight  
during the last few months. From  
July 15 last to Jan. 6 of this year—a  
few days less than six months—514  
marriages were recorded by Registrar  
Lusted. For the preceding half year  
the list ran up to only about 300, so  
that the increase in Windsor's mari-  
monial business has been about 70 per  
cent. Most of the marriages are of De-  
troit people, who come across the river  
to get married. At least 75 per  
cent. of the marriages performed in  
Windsor are those of people from De-  
troit.

Rev. James Livingstone, of the  
Windsor Avenue Methodist church,  
heads the list with 184 to his credit.  
Rev. D. H. Hild, of Sandwich, is a  
close second with 139. The others are  
divided as follows:—Clergymen of the  
parochial residence of St. Alphonsus  
church, 43; Canon Hinder, All Saints  
church, 42; Rev. J. C. Toimie, St.  
Andrew's church, 34; Rev. W. H.  
Beet, of Walkerville, 17; Rev. J. H.  
Russ, Bruce Avenue Baptist, 8; C. E.  
Furton, Chapel of Ascension, 4; the  
Salvation Army officers and itinerant  
ministers, 27.

**FINE MARKSMANSHIP.**

Private Edwards Kills Four Filipinos with  
Five Shots.

Generally speaking the entire civil-  
ized world knows how well the men  
who wear the United States uniform  
can shoot, but in the array of accurate  
ones there are exceptions, and an of-  
ficer just returned from Manila tells of  
one of them.

With General Otis's advance is an  
individual known as Edwards. He is  
a corporal in the Third United States  
Artillery, now serving as infantry, and  
beyond the fact that he gave Kentucky  
as his home nothing is known of him.  
Yet the blood of Daniel Boone, Morgan,  
Ballard, Dave Bowie and a host of  
others famous on the pages of frontier  
history must flow in his veins, or else  
there is something in the Blue Grass  
country that still makes marksmen.

Edwards is a regular, but a hero,  
hence his little exploit with a covey of  
the dusky-skinned natives of Luzon  
has not been previously reported. He  
has not been in the advance scout, and  
with three companions was carefully  
moving through a country all swamp  
and bamboo thickets when he was  
fired on by a hidden foe.

Divining that the shots came from a  
clump of bushes a hundred yards away,  
Edwards charged the clump. He was  
all alone in the charge, but he did not  
mind that. At his first rush four na-  
tives broke cover and made a dash to  
get away. They had a 150 yards to  
start and had only 150 yards to go  
across open country before reaching a  
dense swamp.

Right here Edwards showed how he  
could shoot. He carried the regular  
Krag service piece and had five shells  
in the magazine, with one in the bar-  
rel. He opened fire and five times the  
Krag spit flame and steel jacketed  
bullets. Then all the natives were  
down. An examination of their bodies  
showed that the first was hit at the  
nape of the neck, his spine splintered,  
and he fell dead. The second was hit  
full between the shoulders, and he was  
in two, and he was dead. The third  
was shot through the chest, and the  
small of the back, the spine again be-  
ing battered to splinters.

The fourth man alone escaped in-  
stant death, and at him Edwards fired  
twice. The first ball passed through  
one of his hips and crushed the joint,  
and ere he could fall another tore  
through his jaw about on a line with  
his wisdom teeth, if he had any, and  
from the two wounds he died in ten  
minutes. Edwards still had a shell in  
his gun, but there were no more Fili-  
pino in sight.
