WITH ALL HONORS

Private Gorrie Will be Received
On Monday Afternoon.

Acting Mayor Sulman Will Officially
Welcome Him—Program of
The Day.

Elaborate arrangements are being made, under the direction of Major J. B. Rankin and Acting Mayor G. W. Sulman, to tender Pte. Wm. B. Gorrie, who returns on Monday after a year's active service in South Africa, a royal reception. Pte. Gorrie has been through all the thickest of the Canadian work and is well deserving of the honor. He will arrive on the 4.30 G. T. R. mail train and will be met by a large company of citizens and a procession will be formed, marshalled by Major Rankin and including the city council in carriages, the High school cadets under J. S. Black and Wm. Mowbray and anti-conformity officials. The procession will march to the Grand Opera House, where Acting Mayor Sulman will deliver an address to the returning soldier on behalf of the corporation and citizens. Major Rankin will also deliver an address.

At the conclusion of the Opera House gathering the city council, consisting of Messrs. C. J. public school, health and fire library boards and the officers of the C. C. I. cadets will entertain Pte. Gorrie to luncheon at 6 o'clock at the Hotel Rankin.

The arrangements for the parade are in the hands of Major Rankin and at the meeting and luncheon of Acting Mayor Sulman.

And Sulman requests all the corporation representatives and officials to meet at Harrison Hall at 3.45 Monday afternoon.

TORONTO LIVE STOCK.

Toronto, Nov. 19.—Another large run at the western cattle market last week, but trade not good, and cattle moved slowly; steady demand for the choice grades, and dealers soon pick up all offered; prices continued steady in most lines, and trade showed no improvement; some cattle were sold at lower prices; 50 loads, including 800 calves, 1,500 sheep and lambs, 20 calves.

Export cattle—Trade quiet, and prices steady, at \$1.20 to \$1.40 for choice.

Butchers' cattle—One load of superior beasts sold at \$1.35, and of obtainable, more would be taken at that figure; picked lots worth even more; selling as high as \$1.40 to \$1.75; good cattle sell readily at \$1.50 to \$1.75; medium and common very dull, former at \$1.20 and \$1.25.

Feeders—Offerings liberal and trade brisk, prices no higher, and quality not improved, short keep sell at \$3.50 to \$3.80; heavy at \$3 to \$3.50, and light at \$2.50 to \$3.

Export bulls—Animals offered were of good quality, and they sold readily; prices for heavy 25c higher, at \$3.50 to \$1.25, and light steady, at \$3 to \$1.25.

Stockers—Offerings poor, and as a result quotations lower, at \$1.50 to \$2 per cwt. Light stockers of 400 to 750 lbs. wanted, and are worth \$2.25 to \$3. Feeding bulls, and demand not keen, and only small amount of trading; prices \$2.50 and \$2.75 per cwt.

Milch cows—Good cows in demand; prices steady at \$30 for common to \$60 and \$50 for choice and picked.

Sheep and lambs—Prices steady and trade active; large run.

Calves—Steady and in fair demand.

Hogs—American and foreign, 12 to 20 cwt., all around, announced; select, 160 to 200 pounds, natural weight now worth \$5, and lights and fats are worth \$4.02 to 1-2.

"OLD MOORE'S" PREDICTIONS.

He Gives a Forecast of What the
Next Year Will Bring.

In his London Almanac for 1900 "Old Moore" predicted more than one great war, the assassination of a monarch, and a terrible famine in India, and, as all these predictions proved true, many persons not only in Europe, but also in this country, have been for some time curious to know what kind of predictions he would make in his almanac for 1901. Their curiosity can now be satisfied, for his almanac for the coming year has just appeared.

Here are the principal predictions in it: In January there will be a formidable agitation in France and a severe attack will be made upon the Republic.

In February and March most notable events will take place in the extreme East, and India will threaten to rise up against British dominion.

Though there will be trouble in various quarters during the entire year, April will be a comparatively quiet month.

In May Ireland will follow the example of India and will rebel against England.

In June the anarchy will again come to the front and will give the world much to talk about. During the same month the young King of Spain will be in danger from his political enemies, and he is cautioned to guard against them.

July will be a month of catastrophes, the whole world being threatened at this time with misfortunes of various kinds. Those who are planning to take a journey during this month will do well to remain at home.

August will be comparatively quiet.

During September India will again suffer terribly from famine.

During October the Danubians will start an agitation, which may attain formidable proportions.

In November the Kingdom of Holland will attract attention by its dangerous and novel diplomatic policy, and the statement in the various foreign offices will have to exercise all their skill if they would avoid a conflict.

In December there will be insurrections and strikes in various quarters of the globe. As a rule they may not be of great importance, yet they will occur at this time and they will be the striking features of the month.

As will be seen "Old Moore's" predictions for 1901 are startling, to say the least. His statement in regard to Holland is especially curious, and many persons are puzzling their brains to discover how this little kingdom can ever manage to attract attention by its "dangerous and novel diplomatic policy," which will cause European statesmen to lie awake at night.
