He Tells New Yorkers What he Hopes to do While in England.

New York, June 14.-Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of Canada, and Lady Laurier, sailed to-day for England on the Etruria, to attend the coronation of King Edward. They expect to return home about the end of July or the middle of August.

"I hope to have an opportunity in England," Sir Wilfrid said, "to devise some plans for the greater encouragement of emigration to Canada Canadian emigration has increased materially within the last three years but it is far below what it should be, when one considers the comparative greatness of the country and the unequalled advantages which it offers, particularly to the argiculturally inclined. Emigration from the United States, I am glad to note, is increasing every year. Fully 50,000 have gone from this country across the border during the last three years, and we will be glad to have all the fifty thousands miore she can send."
