ENGLISH NAVY MAY TAKE RADI

In Order to Enable Effective Mounts Solved.

The battleship of the future is to be a strangely weird looking craft if designs which have been worked out prove practicable. The Institution of Naval Architects has been holding a conference in London this week, and one of, if not the most important, paper read and discussed was one which dealt with "the influence of machinery on the gun power of the modern warship," and showed that if the large guns are to be effectively mounted they must all be placed so as to fire on either broadside.

In the Dreadnought of the ten twelve inch guns only eight can fire

In the Breadnoight of the tent welve inch guna only eight can fire on either broadside. To enable all tento fire with the utmost effect it was shown that the funnels must be abolished and also all deck erections. But if the funnels are to be eliminated steam can no longer be used, and the belier must so

steam can no longer be used, and the boiler must go.

The great firm of Vickers have faced this fact and after three years of al-most continuous research and work have now perfected a system of gas machinery for propelling ships. The explosion engine, in a word, is to re-place the steam engine.

Strange Looking Warship. Strange Looking Warship.

The design for such a vessel has been worked out. It has no funnels, and is thus an extraordinary looking craft. Its speed will be higher than that of any existing battleship. Its dimensions are moderate, but it carries batteries more powerful than even the Dreadnought, since all of its ten guns can fire on either beam, and six ahead or astern. This is to be the ship of the future.

Admiral Sir C. Noel said if the marine gas engines foreshadowed could be produced there was no doubt they would be of great value, because they would give ships a higher speed and a much wider radius of action.

First Gas Lamps.

First Gas Lamps.

January 28 was an interesting centenary, that of the first experimental lighting of a street with gas lamps in England, for on that date, 1807. through the exertions of Frederick Albert Winsor, Pall Mall, London, was illuminated with a series of these now familiar sources of light. Winsor's work was the development of the earlier experiments and suggestions of William Murdock, a Scottish mining engineer employed in the Redruth mines, Cornwall. Murdock appears to have been the first to suggest that mines, Cornwall. Murdock appears to have been the first to suggest that gas might be conveyed in tubes and used instead of lamps and candles. He made a very ingenious gas lantern for himself, with which he used to light his way over the Cornish moors at night. This lantern consisted of a bag filled with gas and fitted with a tube at the end of which the gas could be lighted. Carrying the bag under his arm, Murdock used to light his way home at night. On meeting it is said that he would give the bag a squeeze and thus send out a long tongue of flame. This led to his being looked upon as the demon of the Cornish moors.

"It would seem," says The Chronicle, "that the two classes above all interested in the anti-alcoholic propaganda in France are primary school teachers and officers in the army. The next few years must certainly show a great result of their continuous and most wisely directed work. Perhaps to an English mind this zeal on the part of military men is the more remarkable. Temperance refreshment roms in barracks, scientific temperance lectures given by officers, and pledges taken by them among the soldiers, are among the many efforts put forth. In the month of November last five successful temperance lectures were given by different non-commissioned officers and men belonging to one of the regiments quartered in Paris."

Treating a Bruise.

In the treatment of contusions where there is extensive discoloration of the skin if olive oil be freely applied without rubbing the discoloration will quickly disappear. Absorbent cotton may be soaked in the oil and applied. If the skin is broken, a little boric acid should be applied over the abrasion. A black eye thus treated can be rendered normal in a few hours, especially if the oil be applied warm.
