## A LOBSTER'S LEGS.

The Two Front Ones Are Different From the Other Eight.

A lobster's legs, all told, are ten in number, but only eight of these are largely used for walking. The front pair, or big claws, have been specialized, as in the crab and most others of the higher crustaceans, into prehensile organs for catching and crushing the prey. Their use is obvious. Lobsters feed largely off mollusks of various sorts and other hard shelled marine animals. As a rule, the right claw is the slenderer and longer. It has toothlike projections or serrated edges on its nipping faces, and it is rather adapted for biting and severing than for crushing or grinding. The left claw, on the other hand, is usually thicker, heavier and rounder. Its muscles are more powerful, and in place of sharp teeth it has blunt tubercles, or hammers, of different sizes. It acts, in fact, more like a nutcracker than like teeth or a saw. It is a smashing organ. Nevertheless you will find it interesting to observe, by noting the lobsters served to you at able, that this differentiation has hardly as yet become quite constant, for sometimes it is the right claw that displays the hammerlike nuteracker type and the left that acts as nipper and biter, while sometimes no difference occurs at all, both claws alike being sharp toothed or blunt hammered in the same specimen.

A professor of the Swiss Dairy school at Sonntal has compiled statistics of the number of micro organisms found Do any of the youngsters ever wonder why caterpillars have such a funny name? If they do, they decide, no doubt, that it has something to do with cats; and almost certainly they are right. The common explanation of "caterpillar" is that it is the old French "Chatepelose," which means iterally "hairy cat," and is very like our "woolly bear." The last two syllables sugs and the English "piller," a plunderer, and "caterpiller" was the regular spelling until the seventeenth century. Dr. Murray's Dictionary suggests that the word may have come straight from "cat" and "piller." It is noteworthy that a Lombard word for a caterpillar is "gatta" (cat), and a Swiss word "teufelskatz" (devil's cat), while a "catkin" is the vegetable imitation of the caterpillar. in cheese. His experiments lead to the conclusion that every gram (one-thirtieth part of an ounce) of fresh Em-menthaler (Swiss) cheese contains between 90,000 and 100,000 living germs After two months the number has increased to 800,000. Cream cheese contains a still larger number of animalculae, a gram harboring after three weeks 750,000, rising to 2,000,000 after a month and a half. These figures apply only to the center of the cheese, while close to the rind families numbering 5,500,000 bacteria may be found in every gram of cheese. 
