SCORES MR. FISHER

Herbert S. Clements, M. P., Speaks of Hog Slaying Iniquity in Kent County

Ottawa, March 26.—In the House to-day Mr. H. Clements, on a motion for a return, denounced the Government's unjust and unfair methods of dealing with hog cholera in Kent County.

For some time past a horde of Government inspectors had been going around the country feeding upon the fat of the land carrying out the regulations in an improper manner, slaughtering hogs right and left without any attempts at care or precaution being taken to save the droves.

Mr. Clements described these regulations to show their iniquity, and pointed out that farmers having been subjected to the unnecessary law the first time, refrained from reporting subsequent cases of sickness, with the result that the sick ones recovered under treatment and no disease broke out.

The proper course would have been to confine the inspection and penalties to the packing houses.

Mr. Clements read a letter from a prominent hog-raiser in Howard township complaining that the enforcement of the regulations was left to the discretion of local inspectors who were mainly interested in asserting their own authority.

There was little or no disease in the county.

Mr. Fisher's answer was that if there was little or no disease in the county it was due to the efficiency of his hog inspectors.

ESCAPE WAS SENSATIONAL

Mother Helps Son Away from Mimico Industrial School

DROVE UP IN A BUGGY

Toronto, March 27.—Five boys escaped from the Mimico Industrial School within 24 hours from midnight Sunday. Of these two have been captured. The pair, who escaped in their nightgowns, are still at liberty.

The most sensational escape occurred yesterday afternoon right under the nose of Superintendent Ferrier and the rest of the staff. George Cameron is only 14 years old.

Late yesterday Mrs. Ferguson, his mother, living at 62 Beatty avenue, Parkdale, called at the school and requested permission to see her son. She drove up in a buggy, and to all appearances looked the lady from the top of her expensive hat to the sole of her patent leather shoe. Mr. Ferrier granted the request readily.

After interviewing the son, the mother prepared to go away from the institution, and her son, convicted of housebreaking on Wilson avenue, returned to the ranks of the prisoners filling into the supper-room. Suddenly he broke away upon seeing his mother. She hurried after him and followed him into the buggy, covering him with the driving rug until beyond danger from pistol shot.

Before the startled officials could recover their wits she was down the roadway, driving the horse furiously, and her son with her. Her house on Beatty avenue, was searched last night but without finding trace of either mother or son.

NO MASTER MIND

Standard Oil is Directed By Aggregation of Experts.

New York, March 27.—John D. Archbold, vice-president of the Standard Oil Co., testifying at the hearing in the Ouster proceedings brought against the Standard Oil Co. by the State of Missouri, said that John D. Rockefeller knows nothing about the matters concerned in this suit.

"He dislikes very much the notoriety and cartooning," said Mr. Archbold. "If Attorney-General Hadley wants to go to Lakewood and question him, I am sure he will and him willing to answer any questions."

"There is only one way to examine witnesses here," the Attorney-General interrupted, "only one way."

Mr. Archbold said John D. Rockefeller is president of the Standard Oil Co., but has taken no active interest in the business affairs in some years, owing to ill-health.

"Who is the active head of the Standard Oil Co?" asked Attorney-General Hadley.

"There is no master mind in the Standard Oil," replied Mr. Archbold. "It is made up of an aggregation of individuals." The business was controlled by men, experts in their respective departments.
