Plenty of Public Libraries.

Dr. May, inspector of public libraries for Ontario, has returned from an in-spectoral tour through Northern On-taria. He reports the libraries in that part of the Province as in good condi-tion, and a number of new ones have

en established recently. there established recently.

There are about 500 public libraries in Ontario, of which 146 are free. The Provincial Government makes an annual grant to every public library equal to the amount provided by the municipality or other corporation for the purchase of literature. But the amount granted to any library for one year is limited to \$250. Dr. May states that last year the

Library Boards spent about three times as much on their libraries as was given in grants by the Govern-ment, very many of the towns and cities expending much more than the limit of \$250.

In the course of the fourteenth cen tury the book came into the possession of John, bishop of Exeter, who seems to have been somewhat troubled by the inscription as being likely to give rise to injurious suspicions with regard to himself. Accordingly he wrote underneath it under date 1327, "I. John, bishop of Exeter, knew not where the aforesaid house is, nor did I steal this book, but acquired R in a lawful way."-London Advertiser.
