## Editorial Gleanings.

Principal Lay has just completed a census of Amherst and gives the total population at 4,075. Of this number 835 are children, between the ages of six and sixteen years, two hundred of whom do not attend the public schools.

The Dominion Atlantic Ry. is exhibiting in their office on Washington street, Boston, a most tempting display of Gravenstein apples from the "Land of Evangeline." The exhibit attracts great attention and excites very favorable comment.

Ex Queen Liberator, of the Sandwich Islands, has made heavy investments in Winnipeg real estate, through her agent, Mr. Davis, of Hamilton who was in Canada a short time ago. The queen is now one of Winnipeg's largest taxpayers.

The Presbyterian Synod of the Maritime Provinces, was held at Charlottetown, Oct. 2nd, 3rd and 4th. Reports from all branches of work show that the denomination is increasing in strength and membership. The Synod meets next year at Pictou.

The Dominion Department of Agriculture has been informed by Sir Charles Tupper, High Commissioner in England, that Canadian barley is attracting considerable attention in Great Britain in connection with distilling, and that there is the prospect for a large market in Scotland.

So far we have heard very little concerning the municipal elections, which take place next month. In some wards candidates are out, but in this part of the county very little has been heard. It behooves the ratepayers to see that good men are nominated and elected to fill this most important position.

In the last race across the Atlantic the *Majestic* passed the *Paris* and the *Campania* left the *St. Louis* away behind. The United States people may be able to build swifter yachts, but when it comes to the real business of quick ocean transport they are not in it with the ships that sail under the Union Jack.

The season so far has been a most delightful one. Warm days with plenty of sunshine have been the order, and so far there has been no frost worth mentioning. Summer visitors have in many cases extended their stay here longer than they intended, and are delighted with autumn in the "Land of Evangeline."

The Nova Scotia Provincial Educational Association will meet in the Normal School Assembly Hall, Tuesday, Oct. 16th, and continue in session for three days. Some of the most prominent educationalists in the province will be present, and either give addresses or read papers on some features of educational work.

Late advices from England indicate a much more favorable condition of the apple market than was shown earlier in the season. It now looks as though fair prices would be obtainable all through the winter. This will be good news for King's county farmers, who receive the greater part of their income from their orchards.

A great colonial exhibition will be held in Montreal next year opening Oct. 12. The exhibition will comprise the products of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, the Cape Colony, and of Newfoundland. All the exhibits on display in England will be sent over and supplemented by others. The government have guaranteed the sum of \$250,000 to the exhibition.

The members of Bloor St., Toronto, Baptist church have extended a unanimous invitation to the Rev. Charles Eaton, a native of Nova Scotia, to become their pastor in succession to the Rev. O. S. C. Wallace, who resigned to become chancellor of McMaster University. The Rev. Mr. Eaton is now situated at Natick, Mass. He is a graduate of Acadia, and has many friends here who will be glad to learn of his success.

The university of Mount Allison college opened September 19th, and never before in the history of the institution has there been such a large number of students enrolled, making an excellent outlook for the future. The freshmen class surpasses in point of numbers all the classes which have preceded it. It numbers about 60. It is expected that the senior class will form the largest class ever graduating from the university.

The rapid advance of electricity in the United States may be gauged from the fact that it is estimated that 275,000 horses have already been displaced by its use. These animals would have consumed 45,000,000 bushels of corn per year, and this amount would equal 62,500 or loads, meaning a heavy loss of tonnage to railroads. Agriculturalists and refiners are bound to be embraced by the recent developments in electrical science.

Whenever you find a man floundering with a leaf paper open in his hand, and to one he has not an advertisement in it, five to one he never gave it a job of work; three to one he does not take the paper; two to one that if he is a subscriber he is a delinquent; even odds he never does anything that a publisher would like to see a good paper, and forty to one that the paper is a good one and full of life. He has no other paper to see the paper when it comes out.

## The Opening Lecture.

Dr. R. V. Jones delivered the College opening lecture in College Hall on Monday evening last, taking for his subject "Words as an Instrument of Mental Discipline." In opening he showed the great value of language to man. Words, over man exists as first language. Learning says: "God was too good to have withheld from his poor creatures, perhaps for centuries, a gift like speech." "Any one," says Schopenhauer, "who thinks a man without language thinks of him as one of the brutes."

This faculty of expressing thought either somewhat imperfectly or in all its depth and clearness must have its roots in clarity. The mystery of human thought suggest a superhuman origin. Man has not only language, the power of expression, he has also thought. Carlyle asks believably: "If the greatest event is not the arrival of a thinker in the world?" There is not only the mystery of thought itself, but the mystery of its transmission—"thought leaping out to wed with thought." This phenomenon falls to awaken wonder because of its perpetual occurrence.

Dr. Jones discussed the close relation that exists between thoughts and words. Words are the rational vestment of thought. Words are "the fortresses of thought." The study of words is therefore no trivial thing; a deep insight into their meanings is essential to sound and broad scholarship. This point was elaborated and illustrated in a way that gave great satisfaction to the scholars present. Dr. Jones received the enthusiastic applause of the audience for his instructive address.

## New Brunswick Elections.

The New Brunswick Legislature was dissolved last Friday and Premier Blair will appeal to the people through a general election to be held Oct. 16th. The campaign will be a short one, for which action Mr. Blair is to be congratulated. Voters should at all times be so well informed upon public matters, especially upon provincial questions, as to be ready upon very short notice to render an intelligent decision when appealed to. There appears to be no overshadowing issue in New Brunswick politics, and Premier Blair's government will be judged upon its general record, the most important act of which is the abolition of the legislative council of the province. It being a coalition government neither Liberals nor Conservatives, as such, regard the verdict as of any importance from a party standpoint. Speaking of election campaigns, Max O'Rell says he believes that enough money is spent and enough business is stopped during a presidential campaign in America during the four years of the president's term of office. This may be putting it wrong, but, in view of the contribution he plans John W. Wanssaker of the next little sum of \$40,000 to the Republican campaign fund in New York, the purchase price of the postmaster-generalship—the strongest kind of state-wards are not without foundation in fact.
