

Coming Bye-Election

United Farmers are Active but Neither Liberals or Conservatives Have Made Announcement

President Thomas W. Caldwell of the United Farmers of New Brunswick, who was last week nominated to fill the vacancy in Parliament caused by the resignation of Hon. F. B. Carvell, and his cohort of supporters have been busy every day since the convention, and from all reports they are putting it all over the old-time parties in the way of creating enthusiasm. Meetings at Andover and Grand Falls have been largely attended, and the farmers all over the constituency express the belief that their candidate will win over any opposition that may come into the field.

The United Farmers is a young organization, and their decision to run a candidate for parliament at this time means their making or their breaking. If they hang together to the finish their chance for electing their man, and thus solidly establishing themselves, is apparently very good. If at the last moment they split on the old party lines, it would seem that everything would be about over for the United Farmers.

The names of George W. Upham is mentioned as the Liberal candidate, if the party decides to contest the election, while Hon. B. F. Smith is said to be the choice of the Conservatives. If either or both of these gentlemen decide to run it would seem that they should be making a start.

Fatal Shooting At Centreville

A fearful shooting accident is reported from Centreville, when on Monday evening John Conroy lost his life. Together with a neighbor, Frank Upton, had gone to the woods for small game. The two became separated from each other and Upton hearing a noise in the bushes mistook it for an animal's disturbance and fired point blank. Conroy got the bullet through the abdomen and died almost instantly. He was about 31 years of age and leaves a young wife and two small children. Funeral services were held at Tracey Mills yesterday and were attended by a large concourse of sympathizing friends.

Both young men were very well known and held in high esteem. Upton has been almost beside himself because of his friend's death in such a terrible manner. The hunting season has not yet opened and already come reports of mistaking men for game, an all too common accident which seems utterly inexcusable.

The Election of County Councillors will be held on **TUESDAY The 14th of October NEXT**

Fifteen days public notice of the time and place of holding election to be given by Parish Clerks by posting in three most public places of the parish. Nomination of Candidates to be filed with the Parish Clerk or to be left at his residence at or before six o'clock p.m., on Monday, the sixth day of October next.

Parish Clerk to post names of Candidates in three of the public places in each Polling District on or before Thursday, the ninth day of October next.

Candidates names also to be posted up at the Polling Places before the opening of poll of day of election.

The Parish Clerk or District Clerk (as the case may be) to act as Chairman unless or refuses to serve, or is absent, or not competent by reason of relationship of candidate, when chairman to be chosen by electors present.

Assessors are required to furnish Parish Clerks with list of electors.
