

MINES MUST PAY TAX.

The Transvaal Gold Mines Must Help to Pay the Cost of the War.

NEW YORK, June 13.—A despatch to the World from London says: "The British government has decided to levy \$250,000,000 on the Transvaal gold mines to help pay the cost of the war." Sir David Barbour, formerly finance minister for India, who was commissioned to report upon the taxable capital of these mines, advised Colonial Secretary Chamberlain to levy \$175,000,000, but Mr. Chamberlain, after consulting with Lord Milner, increased

ed the maximum to the amount stated. This action, when it becomes known, is certain to cause consternation among the Kaffirs stockholders, who feared that the idea of taxing the mines, which are mostly owned in England, had been abandoned. As the mines were the real underlying cause of the war, many have maintained that their British owners should be made to bear a large share, at least, of its heavy burden.

TRACKMEN'S STRIKE.

Committee Ask Other Concessions in Addition to Increased Wages.

PORTLAND, Me., June 12.—The general grievance committee today announced that not only is a demand made for an increase in wages, but other concessions also are asked of the road. Some of them are as follows: That ten hours shall constitute a day's work—the men to receive time and a half for all extra time and double time for Sunday; that no maintenance of way or fuel men shall be discharged for serving on any grievance committee, and that section men shall be allowed free use of company's dwellings, with fuel at points where men live in such dwellings.

The exact increases demanded are as follows: Yard foremen and men on the system shall receive an increase of 25 cents per day, excepting yard foremen at Portland, Waterville, Bangor, Brunswick and Bath, who shall be paid not less than \$2.50 per day; foremen on Mountain and Quebec division shall not receive less than 35c. per day increase and even the Rockland branch section hands seven cents per day. This rule shall apply to all extra and fence gangs. All coal shovellers and hoisters on the entire system shall receive a minimum of \$1.75 per day.

Y. M. C. A. JUBILEE.

President Repudiates Circular Re Statutory—Great Crowds Attend.

BOSTON, June 12.—The great influx of delegates during the past 24 hours largely augmented the audiences that filled Mechanics Hall to-day at the Y. M. C. A. convention. This morning President Wm. E. Dodge implied repudiation on behalf of the convention of the remarkable circular issued yesterday by a few members of the association condemning the Boston Museum of Fine Arts as an improper place for the young people to meet at a reception.

Although couched in moderate language, his words were strong and forceful and were greeted by applause. The evening meeting most strongly appealed to the popular taste, on account of the military and naval heroes announced as speakers. The audience filled every corner of the big hall and was widely enthusiastic in its reception, especially of General Wheeler and Captain Hobson.

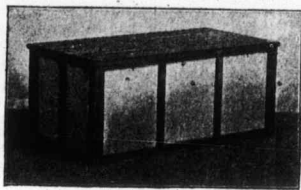

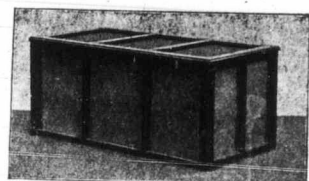
