GROSS LIBELS. In Portland some time ago, a policeman named Malone arrested a bad character named McFarlane, having good ground to suppose he had committed a felony. McFarlane escaped from the policeman after the arrest,—something that an innocent man would not have done—and Malone shot him. Malone's trial came on before Judge Wetmore in St. John; the Judge explained the law, and according to the drift and spirit of the law charged the jury; leaving certain undecided matters to the discretion of the Jurors. Malone was acquitted.

arrest so made under such belief, the constable having reasonable cause for believing a felony has been committed can be sustained, by the constable. And if in maintaining such arrest and securing the party so arrested, a killing takes place by the constable, such killing will be justified, if such killing became necessary to secure the person of the prisoner arrested; but to justify such killing, there must be an absolute necessity for the killing in order to secure the arrest at the time.

Here it will be seen that the shooting is only justified after the arrest has been made; that is in maintaining the arrest, which would be the re-arranging, and then only after good grounds had existed for supposing that a felony had been committed. The libeller further says after quoting the garbled report of the address:—

Judge Wetmore before whom the homicide was tried, on an indictment for manslaughter, charged the jury to consider the shooting as a perfectly lawful if not laudable act.

Also notice. The Judge cited the law, and left its application to the jury; and instead of applauding the shooting, he said:—

"This is a very unfortunate affair. It would have been more satisfactory to all parties that the poor man had been allowed to escape, and retaining him left to chances that might occur at some subsequent period."

But without realising the Judges charge as correctly reported and with reckless disregard for decency or truth the libeller of the Herald further writes:—

This charge is even a greater outrage than the crime which the prisoner had committed. Malone killed one man, but this judicial deliverance may result in the killing of several.

Judge Wetmore's concluding sentences are as follows as the rest of his charge. The use of deadly weapons against a fellow being, except in self-defence, is a crime in itself.

Six months jail, would be about the best answer to this slanderer of our Judiciary—we shall trouble ourselves no further with him.

IRISH AFFAIRS. The case of Mr. William. Benca Jones, a gentleman farmer, near Bandon, county Cork, who is now being boycotted, is even more remarkable than that of Capt. Boycott himself. He farms nearly a thousand acres, and has lived in Ireland since 1840. He has spent £25,000 on improvements. His rents are about double the government valuation. He states that his tenants were willing to pay the usual rents, but on December 2, they received notices forbidding them to do so. The next day threatening notices were posted on his front door and a grave was dug in the grass near by. Notices threatening his tenants were afterwards stuck all over the town. The tenants were consequently obliged to refuse to pay more than Griffith's valuation. Last Saturday some oats which Mr. Jones had sent into Bandon could not find a purchaser. They still lie unsold. On the same morning thirty laborers employed on his farm received the following notice: "Strike on Monday. Mr. Benca Jones is boycotted. God save Ireland." Mr. Jones on learning this, sent notices to the police, who visited the place and assured the workmen that they would be protected if they remained. But on Monday all left, including a mason, a carpenter, a gamekeeper and a coachman, but the baker, gardener, dairyman and another domestic remained, as they did not receive the notice to leave. Mr. Jones' son and daughter had to endeavor to supply the wants of the cattle on the farm as far as they could. In this work they were protected by two policemen. Local traders will not supply Mr. Jones, and his house has to be guarded at night. Things were quiet today, but a long siege is expected to take place, as Mr. Jones is a man of considerable resolution and strength of purpose. Some most remarkable incidents in connection with his boycotting occurred today. Thirty head of cattle and forty sheep belonging to Mr. Jones arrived at Cork yesterday for shipment to Bristol. When the cattle arrived at the steam packet company's yard they were recognized as belonging to Mr. Jones. Several cattle shippers went immediately in a body to one of the directors of the company and said that if Mr. Jones' cattle were allowed on board the vessel they would cease to have any further dealings with the company. The officials acceded to these representations and refused to allow the beasts on board. The
