One Jesson we cught to learn very thoroughly and that is if we want temperance legislation we must see to it, irrespective of our political shibboleths, that we send temperan-

e legislators to do our legislating. 14. Another is a need for a thor ough organization of the whole cour ough organization of the whole country to bring out the full vote in favor of prohibition. The last vote in favor of prohibition gave a large majority in its favor and there is ttle doubt that a large majority will be given in its favor again, especially now since women have an qual vote with the men.

15. The announcement was made on May 7, officially by the premier, that the referendum on the prohibit ory law of this morning would be taken some time early in July. also announced that the questions to be submitted had been prepared.
but would not be disclosed until the
date for the vote had been fixed. We have every reason to believe the questions will be satisfactory.

16. It is now our duty to see that thorough organization of the whole province is made so that in every polling place we have satisfactor arrangements made to bring out the full temperance vote.
