## SUDDEN DEATH OF PROMINENT CITIZEN

The death of Hon. Donald Morrison occurred at the Miramichi Hospital, Saturday afternoon, Sept. 4th, at 4.15 o'clock. The late Mr. Morrison, became critically ill about 10 days previous to his death, and was immediately taken to the Hospital where everything possible was done, but all of no avail. The community was grieved to hear of his sickness and subsequent death, and not only Newcastle and the Miramichi, but the Province at large has lost one of its most prominent and ambitious citizens. Deceased was born at Blint Church in 1851, and came to Newcastle when a young man and was employed as clerk for a number of years by the late Mr. Davidson. He then entered into business for himself and for a great number of years conducted a Dry Goods and Furniture Business in the Morrison Block on Castle St. in Newcastle, and also did a large business in blueberries.

He married Miss Janie Fish daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Fish and resided on Pleasant Street.

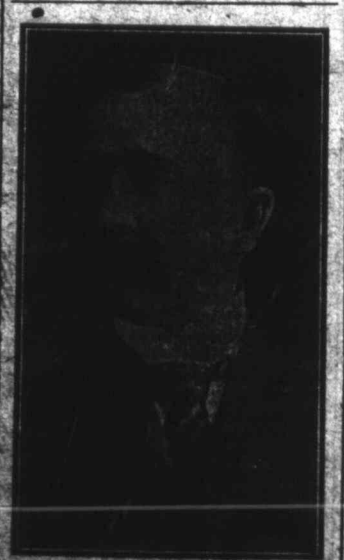
In religion deceased was a Presbyterian, and for many years was a member of the Board of Trustees of St. James' Church acting in the capacity of Financial Secretary to the Board. He was a staunch Conservative in politics, and was the standard bearer of the Conservative party for the Federal House in 1911, in which contest he was defeated by a small majority by the present representative W. S. Loggie, M. P. For many years he was one of Northumberland's representatives in the Provincial Assembly at Fredericton, and while there faithfully served his constituency. In 1910 he was Speaker of the House at Fredericton, and resigned the honorable position to accept the candidacy for the Conservative Party in the Federal Election in 1911.

He was mayor of Newcastle for a number of years and also served as Alderman. For the past few years deceased was Fishery Inspector for Northern New Brunswick and in that capacity gave most efficient service. He was largely interested in the lumber business, and was Managing Director of The Newcastle Steamboat Co. Ltd.

Besides his wife, he is survived by three sons and one daughter Sydney of Vancouver, B. C. Leroy and Ray at home and Mrs. Clarence Wright of Fort Fairfield, Maine, U. S. A.

His two sons Sydney and Leroy are veterans of the Great War, and Sydney served in the South African War.

The funeral of the late Mr. Morrison which was one of the largest held in Newcastle took place from

his late residence, Monday afternoon, Sept. 6th at 3 o'clock, under the auspices of L. O. L. No. 47, of which society deceased was a faithful member. Services at the house and graves were conducted by Rev. L. H. MacLean, pastor of St. James' Presbyterian Church. The pallbearers were Messrs. E. A. McCurdy, A. G. Paton, W. A. Park, James Fox, C. C. Stubbins, and John Burt.

## BLACKVILLE HORSE LOWERS RECORD

Houlton, Me., Sept. 3.—After two days' postponement the card of the Houlton fair was nearly made up today, with racing from sunrise to sunset with twenty-two heats and many exciting finishes. The track record was broken by Bill Sharon, Archie Alcorn's trotter from Blackville (N. B.), which stopped the second heat of the 2.19 class in 2.12 1/4. Blagon Worthy, the Halifax trotter took the 2.30 trot in three straight heats. Harry Nevers of Houlton, had a big day driving winners in three classes. The crowd on the grounds today was estimated at 20,000.

The unfinished races brought over from Tuesday were finished, three more heats were run off before the Fredericton pace, Roy Volo won the 2.13 mixed, dropping two heats to Commodore Douglas. Northern Mac and Marion L. landed first and second money in the 2.30 pace. The 2.25 class was called off with first and second money going to the Boston horses, Alfred King and Neptune Boy of the Frank Fox string.

Four races, including the \$1,000 race-for-all, are on the card for Saturday.

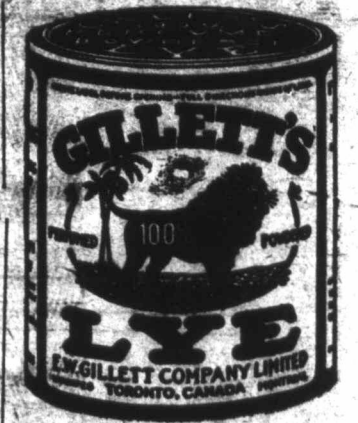
