Continuing Factional Obstruction.

HON. MESSRS DICKEY and Desjardins and Sir Donald Smith, the Commissioners appointed by the Dominion Government to confer with the Greenway Government regarding the school question, have returned to Ottawa from Winnipeg, their negotiations having failed to produce the desired results.

Continuing Factional Obstruction. The Dominion delegates proposed that the Catholics be given privileges substantially similar to those enjoyed in the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick schools, the Catholics to have separate school houses in populous districts and Catholic children in other schools to be exempt from religious instruction, and objectionable passages in the text-books to be removed.

Referring to the conference between the representatives of the Dominion Government and the Greenway Government on the school question, the Winnipeg Press, among other things, has this to say: "Mr. Laurier was anxious for a settlement, but Sir Richard Cartwright, Mr. Mulock, Mr. Edgar, Mr. Davies and other leading lights of the Liberal party, are not so anxious to reach a settlement, and their attitude is manifestly one of obstruction."

HON. MR. PETERS has given notice of his intention to introduce a bill providing for the sale of Government House property, after the terms of the present Lieutenant Governor shall expire. It appears to us that it is a small piece of business to undertake to cut up this land in lots and place them on the market.
