At a large and enthusiastic Convention of Liberal-Conservatives held at Cardigan Bridge on Saturday last Mr. W. A. O. Morson was chosen opposition candidate to contest the district for the seat rendered vacant by the death of the late Hon. Malcolm McDonald.

The Boer delegates arrived here on Friday night by the Princess from Port Louis. The delegation consisted of W. L. Loope and wife, J. M. Lane and wife and H. L. Rood. They were sent by the Imperial Government to look into the methods of agriculture and manufacture in different parts of the Empire, so as to bring this knowledge into practical application in their own country on their return home.

Does Your Baking Powder Contain Alum? Prof. Geo. F. Barker, M.D., University of Penn.: "All the constituents of alum remain (from alum baking powders) in the bread, and the alum itself is reproduced to all intents and purposes when the bread is dissolved by the gastric juice in the process of digestion. I regard the use of alum as highly injurious."

Dr. Alonzo Clark: "A substance (alum) which can derange the stomach should not be tolerated in baking powder." Prof. W. G. Tucker, New York State Chemist: "I believe it (alum) to be decidedly injurious when used as a constituent of food articles." Prof. S. W. Johnson, Yale College: "I regard their (alum and soluble alumina salts) introduction into baking powders as most dangerous to health."

In view of such testimony as this, every care must be exercised by the housewife to exclude the over and over condemned cheap, alum baking powders from the food.
