Famous Bandit Leaves Fortune to Son of Victim.

New York, April 15.—Mr. John Frillman of Oil City, Pa., who was in New York yesterday, had an unusual tale to tell of a legacy. He said he was en route to Danvers, Mass., to deliver a sum of money to a man there whose name he preferred to keep a secret. This money, he said, was left by Jesse James, the outlaw, to a man whose name he preferred to keep a secret. "Years ago," said Frillman, "Orrah Smith, of Allegheny, Pa., lived at a hotel in Omaha, which was frequented by Jesse James and his friends. He and James became close friends. One day James gave Smith a 45-calibre revolver. He said there was a note in the hollow place in the handle, but that Smith must not open the gun's stock until April 9, 1911. He gave Smith to understand that (James) wanted to provide for a boy, and told him he had deposited some money in a bank in Kansas to remain there until the boy grew up. He feared he would not live to see the boy attain manhood, so he entrusted Smith with the instructions.

Had Grown to Manhood. "Last Sunday, being April 9, 1911, Smith opened the gun and found the instructions. He followed them and located the boy, now a grown man, in Danvers, Mass. He deputized me to go to Danvers and tell the boy of his good fortune, and I'm on my way now. I believe the boy was the son of a man James had killed. "The Danvers man," concluded Frillman, "is married and has three children. The money, including principal and interest, now amounts to \$15,000. I don't know why James was so interested in the boy, unless it was sentiments connected with the death of the lad's father."

Boy as Target For His Revolver.

Raoul Cercia, appeared this morning before Recorder Weir, charged with having shot Terence McEwen a little urchin, eight years of age, and who looks little more than six. The shooting was done with a 22 calibre revolver, and the bullet struck the boy in the hand inflicting a rather serious wound. This occurred in the vicinity of Schomer Park, and the firing is supposed to have been done from the window of the accused man's room. Another boy was said to have also been hurt, by a bullet in the shoulder and he was expected to put in an appearance against Cercia this morning, but failed to turn up. Cercia was placed under arrest last night by Constable Smith, after a warrant had been sworn out against him by McEwan's father. When the accused was offered the option of being tried in the Recorder's Court or before the Court of Sessions, he elected for a trial by the Recorder, and the case was continued until next Thursday. During the past few days, boys playing in that neighbourhood were startled to hear the whistling of bullets over their heads and the sharp report of a light calibre gun. No harm was done at the time and no clue could be found as to where the shots were coming from.

Slays Husband With an Axe.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., April 17.—Peter Napolitina, an Italian living near James Street, Little Italy, known here as Peter Naplesik, was killed last evening by his wife Margery. The woman admits the murder and is in jail. Napolitina was employed on the night-shift at the Steel plant. He was asleep in bed when his wife attacked him with an axe. The blow struck him on the forehead and nearly severed his head. Four blows followed, the last one all but severing the head from the body. The woman then went out on the street and told passers-by what she had done. The murder is the echo of the case last fall, when Napolitina returned home unexpectedly and stabbed his wife several times. She was for some months in the hospital. She evidently awaited the opportunity to get even.

Larcenies Recently at Grand Falls.

Last week one of the labourers working at Grand Falls was arrested by Const. Martin for stealing a coat valued at \$12 from the shack of a fellow-workman. Const. Martin did good work in tracing up the theft, found it in the bunk of the party he arrested, and who pleaded guilty before Magistrate Fitzgerald and was fined \$15 or 30 days. Another man was convicted of stealing \$20 from his boarding mistress. He watched for a favourable opportunity last week and when the woman was absent from the house for a short while he went to her apartment, stole the money which was in two bills of \$10 each, from her trunk which he opened. He hid one of the bills behind the tarred paper which covered the walls of a room in the house, and the other he gave to his best girl, who did not know it was stolen and promptly returned it on learning of the matter. The hidden \$10 was found by Const. Martin who is doing good work as an officer at the Falls. The man was sentenced by Magistrate Fitzgerald to pay a fine of \$20 or go to jail for two months. The officer brought him here by yesterday's express to serve the term. The S. S. Prospero came off the Dry Dock a couple of days ago, and while on the stocks received a thorough overhaul. Her engines, boilers, shaft and hull were given necessary repairs and the hull was painted, while the saloon, staterooms, officers quarters and state rooms have been handsomely painted and decorated. The ship will be in fine condition to take up the Northern route and will leave here on her first run in the service to-morrow week. The repairs were carried out under the direction of Supt. McGettigan.
