### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
EDINBURGH, Jan. 2.  
Hans Holmer, of Halifax, won the Powder Hall Marathon, beating a large field of prominent athletes.

BRUSSELS, Jan. 2.  
King Albert announces that a bill will shortly be introduced in Parliament placing the Congo on an autonomous basis, under the suzerainty of the Home Government.

MADRID, Jan. 2.  
King Alfonso, upon the advice of the Dato cabinet, yesterday dissolved the Spanish Parliament, and proclaimed a general election of deputies for March 8th, and of senators for March 15th.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.  
Brigadier General Bliss, commanding the Texan border force, has been instructed by Secretary of War Garrison, to permit Mexican refugees to cross into Texas from Opinaga, if it is necessary to save their lives.

CORO, Venezuela, Jan. 2.  
A family tragedy has resulted in the death, yesterday, of the leaders Cipriano Castro's unsuccessful revolutionary army, Generals Gonzales and Urbina. Urbina shot Gonzales dead, after a quarrel. Later in the day Senora Gonzales, assisted by friend, shot and killed Urbina.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.  
Over 500 men, employed in coal barges in New York harbor, struck today for higher wages. The barge owners said that there were too many men on the waterfront to leave by danger of tying up coal deliveries, and that the places of the strikers would be filled without difficulty.

PEKING, Jan. 2.  
It is officially estimated to-day that 1,000 executions have been carried out in the province of Shu Chuen alone during 1913. Most of these ordered killed were robbers, but in the total has included a large number of political offenders, who had been concerned in various movements during the transition period from empire to republic.

SOPIA, Jan. 2.  
The opening of the Sobranje was marked by an unprecedented demonstration against King Ferdinand. As the King and Queen entered the Parliament building, the Socialist deputies shouted, "Down with the monarchy, long live the republic." When the King began to read his speech, they repeated the cry and added, "Sixty thousand Bulgarians have been sacrificed for the grandeur of the monarchy." The Socialist deputies then left the hall in a body.

LONDON, Jan. 2.  
The purchase by Turkey of the Italian dreadnought Rio de Janeiro, has perturbed not only Greece, Europe in general. Such a simultaneous method of disturbing the balance of naval power, it is held in diplomatic circles, calls for some arrangement among the nations to prevent such a kind. As a first step in this direction some diplomats believe that a demand should be made that England and France close their markets to Turkish loans, raised in order to make war on Greece.

### Greenspond Jottings.

On Dec. 17th, the L. A. Society held their annual Sale of Work in the Lecture Hall. The amount raised satisfied the ladies, as no extra efforts had been put forth this year. The sale was only continued one night.

A very interesting entertainment was given by the Methodist S. School in the Lecture Hall on Xmas night. The entertainment consisted of singing, drills, recitations, etc. The audience so heartily enjoyed it, that some wanted it repeated. Santa Claus appeared during the night and distributed some little reminder to all the scholars of both departments of the Sabbath School. Those who prepared the service were well repaid for their trouble by noticing the expressions of joy on the faces of parents and scholars. The hall was literally packed. At the close of the service the diplomas won by the pupils of the Meth. Sup. School was distributed.

The chairman, Rev. E. Broughton, complimented the pupils on good work done in the C.H.E. exams. in the past, and advised them to still keep at it.

The L. O. Young Britons, the L.O.A. Glover Lodge and L.O.A. Burnett Lodge, held their annual parade today. A very large number of members of all the societies turned out. They attended Divine Service at the Church of England, where the Rev. J. Parsons preached a very instructive sermon. After service the societies paraded the town, and then went to their halls to enjoy a well-prepared dinner, the new brass band imported this fall, will be in use on such occasions as this.

During the past few days some of our sealers have visited the different captains to try and secure berths for the coming spring's sealfishery. It is rumored—and we sincerely hope it is only a rumor—that Capt. W. Winsor has refused to give any Union men berths this spring. If this is true the owners of the different steamships had better take good heed that such things are stopped in time. The people of this country are determined to allow no man or body of men to punish another, because he did not vote as this man or body of men wished.

The water had to be turned off in our pipes a few days ago, to keep it from freezing. Last winter the pipes got broken in one or two places by the heavy frost. The waterworks committee had enough money on hand, to open the pipes and repair damages but none to cover the same again, and make them secure for the winter. Application was made repeatedly to the Government for a small grant to do this useful work, but no money was forthcoming. Money in abundance was spent on useless projects. Some of the money would have been just as well spent if it had been put in envelopes at St. John's and sent to the individuals for whom it was intended. Why was it the Government could not find money for the water service? The reason is easy to see. The waterworks committee was not a vote-catching concern, hence the refusal of the Government to furnish the money. No Government money was ever spent here to better advantage than that spent on our water service. No greater boon was ever given to the people than the same water service. But why wonder at such a thing as this. Is not this in keeping with most of the acts of the present Government?

The use of the auxiliary will greatly facilitate the procuring of bait, especially the caplin, as calm weather is usually experienced during the whole caplin school. It will also be particularly helpful during the trawling season on the Labrador coast, where adverse winds interfere so much with the movements of the ordinary sailing vessels.
