War News.

Messages Received During the Night.

SERBS RESIST AUSTRIAN BOMBARDMENT.

Special to Evening Telegram. The following bulletin was posted at St. Pierre, yesterday:

The German Government has supplied to the American Press information on the supposed use of dum dum bullets by the allies. Germany further adds that she has shown to foreign news correspondents at Berlin these dum dum bullets with machines used in their make, and that these projectiles and equipments were found in the kit of allied prisoners. The French Government has protested most formally against this accusation. It is to be feared that this German move is purely a plan on their part to justify themselves in using these same bullets and bring along a change of ideas in America's opinion, which was so justly indignant over the atrocities committed by German troops throughout Belgium and France. The same efforts were made by Germans near the Danish and Norwegian Governments to endeavor to discredit the allies. There has been no communication from military operations to-day. From Antwerp large German forces have crossed Liege in the direction of Germany. Austrians again bombarded Belgrade, the Serbs resisting vigorously.

OFFICIAL BRITISH SUCCESSES.

Telegram from Secretary of State to Governor, received 5 p.m. Sept. 10. Press Bureau reports battle in France continued yesterday. Enemy driven back all along the line. Our first Army Corps buried two hundred Germans and took twelve Maxim guns and some prisoners. Our second Army Corps has captured three hundred and fifty prisoners and a battery. Germans have suffered severely. Their men are said to be very exhausted. British troops have crossed Marne in northerly direction.

ONE STORY.

LONDON, Sept. 10. According to a Petrograd despatch it is believed there that the German Crown Prince has been appointed Commander-in-Chief of the forces against Russia.

AND ANOTHER.

PARIS, Sept. 10. It is reported that the German Crown Prince has been deposed from his command, owing to his failure to defeat the allies.

BRITISH VICTORY IN AFRICA.

LONDON, this a.m. British troops have met and defeated a German force of four hundred which entered Nyassaland, British Central Africa, according to an announcement made by the Official Press Bureau, which adds: "The Germans lost 7 officers killed and 2 wounded and 2 field and 2 machine guns. The loss among the rank and file has not been ascertained, but was heavy. The British loss among the whites was four killed and several wounded. The loss among the rank and file not known. On Sept. 8th the British force advanced against the Germans, who, however, evaded them and attacked the British station of Karonga, on the northwest shore of Lake Nyassa, which was defended by an officer and 50 African Rifle Police and 8 civilians. After three hours' resistance a column arrived from the British force and drove the enemy off. Later the main British force came up and after a day's fighting, in which the Germans fought with great determination, and had to be dislodged repeatedly with bayonet charges, they retreated toward Tongue River, but the British were too exhausted to continue the pursuit.

THE LOSSES ARE SAID TO HAVE BEEN CONSIDERABLE ON BOTH SIDES, BUT THE MORALE AND HEALTH OF THE TROOPS REMAIN EXCELLENT.

THERE IS NO CONFIRMATION OF THE NEWS PUBLISHED IN THE GERMAN NEWSPAPERS OF THE FALL OF MAUBERGE.

GERMAN COLLIER WITH 5,000 TONS OF WELSH COAL CAPTURED.

LONDON, Sept. 10. The Admiralty announced to-day that a British warship had captured a German collier in the Atlantic with five thousand tons of Welsh coal on board.

POPE SEEKS PEACE SOLUTION.

PARIS, Sept. 10. A Rome despatch says the Pope works daily on a document which will appear shortly setting forth the Pontiff's idea regarding a solution for European peace.

BRITAIN'S LARGE ARMY.

LONDON, Sept. 10. Premier Asquith to-day asked Parliament to add another half million men of all ranks to the regular army. This will bring the total of all ranks in the army to an unprecedented figure for Great Britain at 1,188,400.

DESTROYED BY SUBMARINE.

LONDON, Sept. 10. The British cruiser "Pathfinder," which was sunk in the North Sea with a loss of 246 lives, was blown up by a German submarine. This fact was revealed this afternoon.

when the Government Press Bureau issued the following statement: "The destruction of the Pathfinder was due to attack by a submarine, and not by a floating mine as originally believed."

TRAMP STEAMER MINED.

LONDON, Sept. 10. A despatch from Newcastle, says that the tramp steamer Ottawa struck a mine off Northumberland yesterday, and went down. So far as is known the crew of 26 was lost.

BRITISH CASUALTIES.

LONDON, Sept. 10. Additional British casualties up to Sept. 7th, were officially announced to-day: Officers, killed, 10, wounded, 63, missing 612; men, killed, 61, wounded, 510, missing 2,883.

POPE'S PEACE EFFORTS.

LONDON, Sept. 16. A despatch from Rome says that Pope Benedict has requested the Ambassadors of the nations at present at war, which recognize the Holy See, to ascertain the sentiment of their respective governments with regard to a Papal Peace appeal.

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
