# VICTORY---

The Germans have again retired on the Ancre There is something like an undercurrent of excitement in certain sentences of the messages from London, as if far more momentous tidings were at hand. The position, even in skeleton form on the map, justifies it. Grevillers, now occupied by the British, and Ligny overlook Bapaume from above and below at scarce a mile's distance If our troops can push forward fur ther north and take Achiet, they will cut off direct railway communication between Arras and Bapaume, a very material gain. But it is plain that more than the mere evacuation and occupation of Bapaume is expected. Possibly in these operations military men will be able to see, on a small scale, what a general retreat on this greatly congested front, bristling with huge artillery, really means. No instance of it has yet occurred. We are inclined to share the opinion of a few experts, expressed when first the trench deadlock occurred, that the very strength and consequent immobility of the German line will prove its weakness in the end. Assuming that a retirement over a very wide, or over the whole, front becomes necessary, so great is the concentration of men and guns that army movements, in the old sense. will be impossible, the whole line will move and the retreating forces

### AND THE PRICE. The Agricultural Lectures.

The attention that is being given to the agricultural question in the press and through other channels is gratifying, but mere talking and writing will not grow potatoes or any other vegetables. When, however, the talking contains the practical directions and information that are needed it should fall on as many ears as possible; and for that reason it is to be regretted that the course of lectures being given weekly by Mr. Davies, the Government analyst and an authority on such mat ters, are not better attended. We think the Government is partly to blame for this in not seeing that fuller notice was given and a more convenient lecture hall obtained. The im pression seems to be general amons local farmers, who would most benefit by the addresses, that they are not intended for them but rather for smaller and amateur gardeners. This is not so, for the explanations Mr. Dav ies gives of soils, fertilizers and kinddred matters are of the greatest value to everyone who has land to cultivate. Our farmers lack very much a thorough scientific knowledge of their vocation, and depend, we think, rather too much upon experiment and experience.
