Disorderly Demonstrations

AT FLAT ISLANDS, B.B.

A rather serious demonstration has taken place at Flat Island, B.B., according to the report of the Stipendiary Magistrate at Greenspond. He relates that Constable Simmonds and Tucker searched Coward's Island for intoxicating liquors last Saturday morning, and on returning to Flat Island were met by two motor boats full of hostile men, one boat flying the Union Jack. Upon landing at Flat Island a crowd of about one hundred men met them, bawling, shouting and demanding the constables to leave, and some threatened to throw them overboard. The constables tried to reason with the mob, which eventually gave them ten minutes to leave the island. Arthur Samson, a prominent F. P. U. man, and at one time one of the candidates for the House of Assembly, who was one of the crowd, agreed to take the constables to St. Brendan's and did so. When leaving, the mob cheered and shouted.

It has been decided to send a Stipendiary Magistrate to Flat Island for the purpose of having the ring-leaders arrested and tried, and yesterday a squad of policemen left the city on their way to the scene of the trouble. It is hoped that the evidence to be taken will show that the affair has been exaggerated, but it is evident that there is a spirit of lawlessness abroad, and that the majesty of the law must be vindicated. There seems to be a growing feeling in parts of the country that communities can be a law unto themselves and govern by violence, and too great a speed and determination cannot be shown in putting this down.


The Next Big Air Stunt.
