THE KINDLY PRINCE.

At the Imperial Sports Rally of the British Legion at Wembley Stadium recently the winners of a 100 yards race for the blind (Championship of St. Dunstan's) were being guided to where the Prince of Wales was to present them with their prizes and medals.

The Prince noticed and, turning aside to whisper something to Earl Haig, quickly climbed over the barrier and hurried down the slope to the sightless athletes. There, with a friendly handshake and a cherry word, he presented the prizes, amid the cheers of thousands of spectators.

To watch blind men dashing away in a sprint is a curious sight. Lines of cords are stretched taut the full length of the course about five feet from the ground and a loose ring attached to a piece of ribbon which the competitor grasps to guide him, is run over each cord. In practice at St. Dunstan's a runner is said thus to have covered 100 yards in 15 seconds, only 1/3-10sec. more than the British amateur record.

Magistrate's Court.
