Dairymens' Convention at Ingersoll.

Dairymens' Convention at Ingersoll.

A meeting of a number of the prominent Dairymen of the County of Oxford was held in the Town Hall, at that place on Tuesday last, for the purpose of devising means to develop the dairy interests of Canada, by unity of action on the part of themselves and others engaged in the same business. The result of that meeting was a resolution, on account of which a convention of dairymen met at Ingersoll on the last day of July. It was calculated that there were more than two hundred present, who assembled from various parts of Canada. Among the riumber was Mr. Geo. Shortreed, Guelph Township. The object of convening was to attempt forming a Dairymen's Association for the Dominion of Canada. Mr. William Niles was called to the chair, and Mr. James Noxon acted as Secretary. Committees were appointed; and the Committee on Organization-read the following report which was adopted:

Whereas it is deemed expedient to form a Canadian Dairymen's Association, through which, as a medium, results of the practical experience of dairymen may be gathered and disseminated in the dairying community, therefore be it

Resolved, that we, the undersigned, do hereby associate ourselves together for the mutual improvement in the science of cheese-making, and more efficient action in promoting the general interests of the dairy community.
