The Department at Ottawa has been ngaged in considering the cases of hose whose distilleries or manufactories were recently seized for violation of the Inland Revenue Act. An rder has been made in the case of the Donald & Buchan, tobacco manuacturers at Windsor, making an unonditional surrender to them of \$15.00 worth of property seized last week, salleged, because of the Inland Revenue Act; but upon full investigation of the charges made by the seizing flicers, and the answer of the claimants, it was determined to abandon he seizure.
