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AWFUL RAILWAY ACCIDENT. A CAR IN FLAMES. TEN LIVES LOST

A terrible accident occurred to the Sarnia express on the Great Western Railway which left London on Saturday evening about 6.30. About seven miles west of the city, and within about three miles from Komoka, a fire broke out in the water-closet in the forward end of the first-class car at the rear of the train, caused by a lamp in the water-closet of the car failing on the floor. Fanned by the rapid motion of the train, which was running at a high rate of speed, the flames spread with great rapidity, driving the passengers, panic-stricken and in alarm, to the rear end of the car. The bell rope was not attached to the engine, and consequently there was no way of stopping the train. It was running at the rate of about thirty miles an hour, and ran about three miles burning. The car was destroyed in about six minutes, burning like tinder. Meantime men and women were leaping from the rear end of the car, preferring to risk death so rather than to face it in the more dreadful way that threatened them. For two miles or more along the track, maimed and mutilated passen. ers were lying where they jumped, many of them badly injured others slightly. Some few miraculously escaped unhurt. When the train was brough its is scarcely ascertainable, as the dead are charred beyond recognition, and it is implossible to sceparate the remains so as to tell precisely how many actually suffered death.
