Pekin, Dec. 30.-The Chinese pleni potentiaries have been unexpectedly rdered to sign the preliminary joint note, and have notified the foreign envoys to that effect.

Wu Surprised.

The Chinese themselves were greatly astonished at receiving the Imperial instructions. Neither Li Hung Chang, nor Prince Ching had expected success in persuading the court under ten days.

nder ten days.

The Emperor's instructions are to agree fully to the note, but to en-deavor to get the best terms possi-ble, particularly in the matter of limiting the number of the legation guards and also as to the places where these are to be located.

The plenipotentiaries are instructed to endeavor to limit the number of army posts along the line of railway to as few as possible and final y to request the powers not to troy the forts, but merely to

rm them. Li Hung Chang's health is bad and it is doubtful whether he will be able to do more than to affix his signature to an instrument delegating his powers to Prince Ching, until another plenipotentiary has been apother plenipotentiary has been appointed. He was dressed this morning and carried in a chair to the residence of Prince Ching, with whom he held a long consultation. Prince Ching then called upon the Doyen of the diplomatic corps, the Spanish Minister, Senor De Cologan, and required him to notify the other envoys that instructions had been reroys that instructions had been ceived from the Emperor to sign the

The Report Confirmed.

Paris, Dec. 31.—The Havas Agency has received this despatch from Pekin: "Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang have communicated to the foreign envoys an Imperial edict, in which the Emperor declares that China accepts the joint note, and au-

China accepts the joint note, and authorizes Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang to negotiate and to ask for a suspension of hostilities."

Prince Ching and Li Hung Chang, according to another despatch to the Havas Agency say that Emperor Kwang Su has expressed a desire that the court should return to Pekin at the end of February.

Foreign Communities Pleased.

Pekin, Dec. 29.—The foreign com munities in Pekin are greatly satisfied at the decided tone of the col lective note, and the assertion that the powers are determined to entertain no proposals for the modifica-tion of the demands. It is under-stood Li Hung Chang sent a memor-ial to the throne, couched in very trong terms, urging complete

pliance. The Germans killed 40 Chinese

troops near Man Cheng, 10 miles northwest of Pao Ting Fu. They had no casualties. Among the natives a feeling of great mistrust is being caused, ap-parently by the high-handed action of the Germans, as the Chinese sus-pect them of an intention to force a serious engagement with the Chinese troops.

A Puzzled Chinaman.

Washington, Dec. 31.—Mr. Wu, the Chinese Minister, is somewhat puzzl-ed as to just what construction to place on the Pekin despatch. A LETTER FROM THE POPE May Be Basis of Rupture Between France and the Vatican.

Paris, Dec. 31.—Cardinal Richard, Archbishop of Paris, has received a long letter from the Pope, expressing bitter sorrow at the danger threater ing the religious orders. His Holiness advises the French bishop to work in perfect harmony to safeguard the interests of the congrega-

The anti-Ministerial press make much capital out of the Pope's let-ter, received by the Archbishop of The Gaulois says it foresees a rupture between the Vatican and the Elysee, and declares that the Ministerialists are delighted with the prospect. La Republique ex-presses the fear that Germany and Austria will be able to replace French influence in the far east if the law of associations is passed.

Mines May Be Idle.

Halifax, Dec. 31.—The managers of the collieries in Pictou, Cumber-land and Cape Breton Counties have decided to grant a demand of the miners for a 12 per cent. increase in wages all round on Jan. 1, but have refused to grant a further increase of 10 per cent. in April. The result is that a general strike of the miners of Nova Scotia, from 4,000 to 6,000 men, is imminent.

Norway's Finances Improved.

Stockholm, Dec. 31.—The Norwe-gian financial situation shows great improvement. At the year's end the Swedish banks have sufficient funds for all purposes. The interest is high, but business is good.

The Ashantee Rebellion Ended. London, Dec. 31. — Col. Willcocks has cabled the Government that the Ashanti rebellion has ended, all of the rebel chiefs having surrebdered.
