The firecracker fiend, the speeding motorist, and the bike rider who crowds women and children off the sidewalk, are among the common nuisances that should be immediately suppressed.

A current item says that a supposedly wild man, captured at Sarnia the other day and described as "a hairy cuss," shows no disinclination to talk, but no one can understand what he is saying. It will likely be found that he is one of the higher critics.

A Toronto and a Montreal preacher have been urging the lady members of their churches to carry parasols instead of wearing hats to church, claiming it will be more comfortable for themselves as well as others. It is to be hoped the ladies everywhere will follow this excellent advice.

Canada, for some unknown reason, says the Portland Oregonian, seems to be getting a much better class of immigrants from the old world, as well as from the United States. Of the 40,000 who entered through Halifax this year, more than 30,000 were of British origin, the Scotch predominating. The habits and industries of this class make them preferable to the type that enters through the Atlantic ports of the United States.

CURRENCY AND COMMENT

Patrick Cudahy, of Chicago, one of the leading packers of the United States, says: "Our next sensation will be four cent hogs. It looks to me as though prices would keep going down for a year or more."

John Goodison, of Sarnia, has disposed of his beautiful heavy draught team of horses, which were shown at the leading country fair last fall and scooped up the prizes, for \$850. Shortly after the animals were sold he received a much higher offer for them.

Twenty-six municipalities, said Hon. Adam Beck at Toronto, have contracted for 44,000 Niagara horse-power and applications for power have been received from 62 unincorporated villages. And the scheme is only just started!

Serious consequences were prevented at a fire in a public school building in London, Wednesday, when 600 children, trained to fire drill, marched steadily through smoke without the least panic. The fire was started by a boy throwing a firecracker into a register.

The town of Clinton has seven miles of water mains, 56 hydrants, and a reserve reservoir holding 80,000 gallons of water. The cost of running the system for one year, including engineer's salary, coal, and all other expenses, was \$850, while they had receipts of \$2,850, giving them a surplus the first year of \$2,000.

W. J. Stewart, a member of the board of education of Alberta, is on his way to Ireland to engage 1,000 school teachers for Alberta and Saskatchewan. He says new districts have been opened so rapidly this year that teachers cannot be found to look after the schools. Mr. Stewart declares that his only trouble in bringing out Irish girls to the West to teach is that they are good looking and attractive, and that they quickly get married. This time he will try to get at least a certain number to sign contracts to teach for a stated period.

Every growing and ambitious town is composed of three elements. Those who work patriotically, vigorously and intelligently for its advancement; those who are in a state of apathy or indifference, and those who take a curious delight in discouraging the efforts of others by ridicule, and by a persistent denial that any progress can or has been accomplished, and by the boasts of every other town besides their town. The last class are called croakers, but they are really something worse, for their opposition does not arise simply from despondency but from the inevitable spirit that will neither act itself or suffer others to act.

CONCERNING KIESELGUHR.

Infusorial Earth That Possesses Valuable Properties.

Kieselguhr is a variety of infusorial earth which is used as a filler for soap, sealing wax, paints and other products and employed in the manufacture of dynamite, alizarine, soluble glass, cements, artificial stone, articles of gutta percha and india rubber and for many other purposes.

Kieselguhr is found in large quantities in Hanover, where it occurs in gray, brown or pale green layers in alluvial deposits and near beds of lignite. It is soft and dry to the touch, absorbs water very readily and is not affected by chemical reagents at ordinary temperatures. Kieselguhr is found also in Hesse, Hungary, Bohemia, Tuscany, Sweden, Finland and Canada.

The valuable properties of kieselguhr are its low specific gravity (0.25 to 0.55), its great power of absorbing water and its low thermal conductivity, which make it one of the best known heat insulators.

It is extracted from open pits, spread on planks on the ground and left to dry under the action of the sun and the wind. Artificial desiccation has not proved practically successful, according to a report of the American consul at Hamburg. Drying in ovens presents no difficulty, but also no particular advantage and has never been attempted on a large scale. Kieselguhr is quickly calcined by contact with flame. Various mechanical drying processes have been tried and abandoned in Germany. Drying by a blast of hot air has been employed to some extent, but only in wet seasons or after partial drying in the usual way. The method is too expensive for use except for the best grade of kieselguhr, which is employed in making dynamite and when the market price is unusually high.

Kieselguhr as it is taken from the pit contains from 70 to 90 per cent of water, which evaporates very slowly. Air dried kieselguhr retains from 15 to 25 per cent of water. The dried kieselguhr is ground and packed in bags. During transportation and storage it must be carefully protected from dampness.—Cosmos.

High Fever in Plants.

Heat sufficient to destroy life, generated by the normal function of respiration, has been the surprising discovery of Professor Hans Molisch of Prague. Freshly cut leaves were insulated in wood, wool and cloth, with a thermometer protruding, and in nine hours they had become heated from 22 to 44 degrees C. and within fifteen hours to 51.5 degrees C. (125 degrees F.). In the next thirty-seven hours the temperature fell to 34 degrees C. then rose to 47 degrees C., then fell finally. A test at 43 degrees C. showed the leaves to be still alive. The first rise in temperature could be explained only as a result of respiration of the leaves, and the second rise was due to the rapid development of bacteria, which were few until after first maximum had been passed. By inclosing one end of a tube of ether in a mass of insulated leaves the effects of a vegetable furnace were shown. The liquid boils at 34.5 degrees C., and in this "furnace" it was very soon boiling vigorously.

Powerful Eye Magnets.

Many hospitals in England are provided with a special apparatus for extracting iron and steel fragments from the eye by means of powerful electro magnets. The magnet employed has a core three feet long and six inches in diameter of the best Swedish soft iron. Two hundred pounds of insulated wire are wound in two coils about the core. The end of the magnet is threaded to receive terminals of different shapes to suit various conditions. The magnet is mounted on ball bearings and can be moved in any direction. The strength of the magnetic field may be varied at will by means of a rheostat. When used at its maximum power the magnet exerts a pull of thirty pounds per square inch at distance of an inch. A special type of apparatus is provided for reclining patients. In this case the magnet is mounted on trunnions and is tilted by means of suitable gearing operated by a hand crank.—Scientific American.

Legal Status of the Snail in France. The French minister of agriculture, after a careful examination of the subject, has established "the legal status of the snail" by issuing a circular in which snails are defined as animals injurious to vegetation and therefore legally subject to capture and destruction at all times and seasons. This decision has created excitement and dismay among the numerous persons who earn a livelihood by collecting snails for market. Snails are in high favor with French epicures, and immense numbers of these mollusks are eaten in Paris. In the winter of 1900 the consumption of snails in the French capital amounted to 800 tons. The consumption has since diminished, but more than 80,000,000 snails are still received annually by the Halles Centrales, the great market of Paris.

Grinding Cement.

Fineness of grain is greatly to be desired both in finished cement and in the raw materials of which it is made. In the new Pfeiffer cement machine the process of grinding is kept separate from the expulsion of the meal or product of grinding. The last named operation is effected by means of a tumbling mill of peculiar construction, which, without employing any sieves, delivers a product of very fine grain. The machine requires much less power than the ordinary machine, so that a very fine cement can be produced more cheaply than common cement is produced by the usual methods.
