THE WEATHER PROPHET.

Toronto, Aug. 4-11 p.m.—The pressure is lowest over the lake region and Northwest Territories, and about average in Manitoba and Maritime Provinces. Local showers and thunderstorms have been prevalent in Ontario and Quebec, and the weather has been fine in other parts of the Dominion. Winds on the lakes have been moderate to fresh and variable. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 59-86; Prince Albert, 42-72; Regina, 42-82; Winnipeg, 56-72; Toronto, 65-85; Montreal, 72-88; Quebec, 66-87; Halifax, 65-85.
