THE WEATHER PROPHECY.
TORONTO, Aug. 27.—A little depression, which was south of Lake Erie last night has moved quickly eastward with increasing energy, and is now central in New Brunswick, causing strong winds and gales with heavy rain throughout the Maritime Provinces. From Manitoba west to Qu'Appelle the weather has been rainy. On the lakes the wind has been from the west and north-west, with moderate and maximum temperatures: Qu'Appelle, 48-52; Winnipeg, 44-48; Qu'Appelle, 48-52; Toronto, 61-74; Montreal, 62-66; Quebec, 56-64; Halifax, 57-61.

TO-DAY'S PROBABILITIES.
TORONTO, Aug. 28.—The indications for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and all east and west of the Great Lakes) are: light to south-west winds; fine weather; stationary or higher temperature to-day, easterly winds and rain to-morrow.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.
—The London Hunt will have a meet at the Boreas to-morrow afternoon.
—Mrs. Mary A. Eidy has returned from visiting friends at Port Huron and Detroit.
—Mrs. (Rev.) Ferguson, of London, and children, are visiting relatives in this city.
—More than 300 pupils were in attendance at the reopening of London West school this week.
—Miss N. Eidy has returned after a very pleasant visit with friends at Toronto, Newmarket and Collingwood.
—After two months' pleasant visiting in the East, Miss Fannie Trebilcock, Piccadilly street, has returned home.
—Rev. Dr. Bethune, of Port Hope, president of the Entomological Society of Ontario, left for home this afternoon.
—Mr. W. F. Blake, formerly U. S. consular agent, is staying for a day or two with Mr. Frank Leonard. Mr. Blake has his family with him.
—Mr. Thos. B. Parker, C. P. R. city agent, and wife have returned home from an extended outing in Muskoka, feeling much improved in health.
—Mr. C. B. Armstrong, of this city, is the assignee to whom Mr. B. F. Kastner, of Mitchell, has assigned in order to complete a composition with his creditors.
—Among those in attendance at the banquet to Hon. J. W. Longley, Attorney-General of Nova Scotia, last night were Messrs. John Cameron and Geo. C. Gibbons, of this city.
—The members of the Entomological Society left at nine o'clock this morning in a bus, for a day's outing and a trip through the green fields, where they can study nature in its most natural aspect.
—The regular Wednesday afternoon concert by "P" Company band, I. S. C., in Victoria Park yesterday afternoon was well attended. A good programme received an excellent rendition and was greatly appreciated.
—The funeral of the late Mrs. P. Schram

took place from her son's residence, South London, to Woodland Cemetery, and was attended by a large circle of friends, among whom were many of the city's early pioneers. The pallbearers were Sheriff Glass, Col. Macbeth, Capt. Burgess and Messrs. E. J. Parke, George Harris and William Robison.

—The garden party held on the grounds of Ald. Luney last evening under the auspices of the Wellington Street Methodist Church was a great success. The lawn was tastefully decorated with Chinese lanterns of variegated colors, affording splendid scope for the numerous promiscuous. The refreshment stands presided over by the ladies received their full share of patronage.

—The concert by the band of the Seventh Fusiliers in Victoria Park last evening was attended by the usual crowd, who promenade up and down, while as many as possible squeezed into the limited number of seats. The programme was rendered in a manner characteristic of the Seventh's standard of excellence. The number "on sacred songs," containing a number of well-known Gospel tunes, was much appreciated.

—The Department of Inland Revenue has made another move in the battle with the taxpayer, and a circular has been sent out stating that if any two portions (top or bottom or sides) of a used cigar box are exposed to the light, a compliance is required. The object of this is to allow exposures of these boxes by dealers on top shelves as dummies. It is hoped that the Minister has at last mastered the problem how to destroy an empty cigar box.

—Mr. John Heard, of St. Thomas, and father of Mr. H. Heard, of this city, died at his home yesterday at the advanced age of 73 years. Deceased was a native of England and came to this country about 50 years ago. His wife survives him. The other members of the family living are: Thomas, of St. Thomas; John, of St. Thomas; Mrs. Battory, of Bradford, Pa.; Miss Charlotte Heard, Stratford, and Mrs. Jolliffe and Mrs. John Stacey, St. Thomas.

—The arbitrators in the suit of Wegenhast & Robertson vs. The Wellington Mutual, Gore Mutual, Economical Mutual, and Huron and Middlesex Mutual Insurance Companies, viz.: Messrs. J. H. Flock, Q.C., London; W. F. Findlay, accountant, Hamilton, and Jas. Casfield, clerk County Court, Woodstock, appointed to decide on the amount of loss sustained and claimed by the firm from the insurance companies, have made their award, and have found the loss to be \$3,020 being much less than the amount claimed from the companies; each party to pay their own costs.

Stationary Engineers' Election.
The regular monthly meeting of Unity No. 5, Stationary Engineers' Association of this city, was held in Sherwood Hall, when the following officers were elected for the ensuing term: Past president, Thos. A Short Session.
Magistrate Parke transacted his business this morning in ten minutes. A batch of liquor cases adjourned from last week were to have been ventilated, but Mr. McKillop, on behalf of the Crown, was granted a fourth adjournment until next Thursday in order that the witnesses might be present. Messrs. McMartin, Ryan, Small, James, Lewis and others will figure prominently in the cases when they are brought up.

Mary Doyle, a slatternly-looking woman, was charged by Thomas J. Jeon with the larceny of \$17 in bank bills and silver. The woman was arrested yesterday by P. C. Campbell, who stated he had heard that Johnson and the prisoner had registered at a man and wife in the Royal Hotel last night and while there the theft was committed. Johnson did not appear in the court, so the woman was discharged with a warning from the Magistrate.

Mr. Peel in Toronto.
Mr. Paul Peel, the Canadian artist, whose picture, "After the Bath," secured such distinguished recognition in the Paris Salon, was in town yesterday, and in a few moments of pleasant conversation he informed a Globe representative that his present stay in Canada would be short, as he was arranging to take a further course of study in Spain. Although Mr. Peel has been residing in Paris for ten years and was married there he has not lost his love for his old home. His father and mother reside in London, Ont., and the illness of his father was the chief motive of his visit just now. Mr. Peel hopes to take up his permanent residence here in a year or so, and as Mrs. Peel also is an artist of considerable standing they will be welcome addition to social and artistic circles. Before returning to Paris Mr. Peel will superintend an exhibition of his pictures, which will be given in this city in October. During his brief stay in the city Mr. Peel received attention from several distinguished Torontonians.—(Toronto Globe).

Strathroy.
A special meeting of the Town Council was held on Monday evening to pass the bylaw for the front street drain, involving an expenditure of \$495. It was also understood that a bylaw for a drain on Malind avenue would be prepared for next meeting. Councillor Cox reported that the County Engineer had first promised to call for tenders for a bridge on the line between Carleton Place and Strathroy, but afterwards cancelled his action. The monthly meeting will be held next Monday evening.

The Young Ladies' Society of St. John's Church will at an early date hold a harvest thanksgiving service.
Strathroy's rate of taxation for this year is 12 cents on the dollar.
Charles Tanner, who had been only a short time in the House of Refuge, ran away last Thursday and has not since been found. He was rather weak in mind.

The House of Refuge Committee met here on Tuesday, when the following were present: Messrs. Harrison, Augustine, Hardy, Corbett, Duffin and Taylor. They visited the house, where everything was found satisfactory, and then met at the Queen's Hotel, passed a number of accounts, and resolved to advertise for tenders for the erection of two fire escapes.

Mr. A. De Guerre, mathematical master in the Collegiate Institute here, has resigned, and the Board is trying to get a successor.
Arrangements have been made to hold Caledonian games on the Fair Grounds here on Friday, Sept. 12, and a grand Scottish concert in Albert Hall on the same evening.

The Public School Board has appointed Miss Alice Anderson teacher of music, and R. S. McDougal teacher of drill and calisthenics for the model school, which opens here on Sept. 1. D. L. Leitch will

teach in the Principal's room while the latter is in charge of the model school.
Where's Baby's Mother?
Yesterday afternoon the family circle of Mr. and Mrs. Thompson, No. 431 Piccadilly street, was enlarged by the addition of a bright little male child of about 5 months, which two well-dressed young women are credited with having deposited in the hallway of the family's cottage while the occupants were out. The child was well supplied with clothes, and took kindly to the new circle of acquaintances. No note nor guarantee for the child's keep was to be found among the new comer's clothing, and naturally the good people with whom it was left feel some concern regarding the whereabouts of its parents. Their family is large, and the husband has been unable to do any work for the past three years, being troubled with softening of the brain. A neighbor woman told a reporter that she saw the women who are supposed to have left the child, and described them as of about 25 years of age. One of them was dressed in black and the other in a dress of blue material trimmed with white braid and flowers. Some time ago, she said while living in a different part of the city, two women had made an effort to get her to keep an illegitimate child, but she refused on account of her advanced age. She is convinced that the child left at Mrs. Thompson's is the same one and says that its mother was formerly engaged as a domestic in a leading city hotel, and that the father of the child was a brother of the girl's former employer. The matter has been left in the hands of the police.

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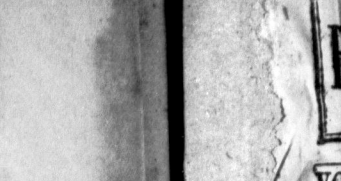
