

An Attack on China's Capital

Made by the Russian Relieving Forces.

Their Timely Arrival Said to Have Checked the Attempt to Destroy the Legations-Report of General Massacre of Europeans-The French as Well as the German Minister Murdered-700 Chinese Killed in

the Taku Forts.

The Russian relieving force arrived outside of Pekin this morning, says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express, and immediately began to attack the city, on both sides, employing numerous artillery. The force apparently arrived in the nick of time, for the Chinese assert that the attack upon the legations had

been successfully renewed. On the night of June 16 the Chinese troops, under Gens. Tung Fuh Siag and Tun Ching, attacked the legations and set on fire five European buildings. GENERAL MASSACRE OF EURO-

PEANS REFORTED. Nothing definite is known as to the result, except that the Chinese were disappointed, although other reports, uterly discredited by foreigners here, are that the Chinese, infuriated by the destruction of Taku, have since massacred all the foreigners in Pekin. A modified version of these rumors received at Berlin is that the French. as well as the German minister, has been killed. A WOMAN MISSIONARY'S STORY. San Francisco, June 20.-Mrs. A. P. Lowrie, a Presbyterian missionary, who has been stationed at Pao Ting Fu for the last six years, arrived here on the Doric. She reports that on the night of May 16 many native Christions, principally women and children, were murdered by the Boxers while fleeing from Pao Ting toward Tien Tsin. This was about ten miles from Mrs. Lowrie's station, which was not disturbed. The native Christians had been attacked on May 13, and had successfully repulsed the horde of murderers, but in trying to Lach Tien Tsin Koriets, and not the Manschur, that the following night, they were over-the explosion occurred, killing and taken and murdered. Koberts

Heard From at Last-Krugersdorp Occupied by the British-Methuen Defeats Dewet's Force - General Kitchener Very Narrowly Escapes

London, June 20 .- The war office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts: "Pretoria, June 20. -Hunter's advance column occupied Krugersdorp without opposition, June 18. Methuen, who was escorting a large convoy to Helibron, yesterday routed a force under Christian Dewet, who endeavored to prevent him from entering the little town. Methuen had only three casualties.

"Baden-Powell left this city today on his return to Rustenburg. The country is quieting down in that direction. This satisfactory state of affairs will be materially assisted by the capture between here and Rustenburg, June 19, of two guns by Hutton's Mounted Infantry, and a body of the enemy under Commandant Duplessis.

"Railway and telegraph communica-tio with Cape Town is now completely restored. "All is quiet here and at Johannesburg. The shops are open and the market is daily becoming more crowd-ed and businesslike."

KITCHENER'S NARROW ESCAPE. Noon.—According to a Cape Town dispatch, Gen. Kitchener had a narrow escape from capture in the engagement at Loeuw Spruit, on June 14. He was sleeping in the repair train, when the latter was attacked and many of the engineers captured. Gen. Kitchener's sleeping car was at Kopjes Station, when the Boers, under Gen. Dewet, suddenly opened a rifle fire at 3 a.m. Kitchener managed to reach his horse and galloped to Rhenoster, two miles distant. The Boers numbered 900 men, with three guns. They burned the culvert, which had just been rebuilt, and derailed the train. The Boers alleged to be hemmed in by Gen. Rundle began shelling Ficksburg on June 19. It is said they apprehend that a force is marching from the north upon them, hence they will endeavor to break

through southward. ANNAPOLIS LIBERALS.

HAS RESIGNED

Principal Rose, of the London School of Art, Leaving the City-Financial Aid Needed by the School.

Mr. E. Rose, principal of the London School of Art and Design, has resigned his position and will soon remove with his family to Ann Arbor, Mich. There is a possibility that Mr. Rose will return to this city in the fall. will depend largely upon the financial condition of the school, which, for some time past, appears to have been far from satisfactory. A committee was recently appointed by the board to devise schemes for its betterment. Mr. Rose is of the opinion that this city affords such splendid opportunities for a successful school that it would be a pity to allow it to go down for want of some practical assistance. The annual report for the past year that has just been issued. contains evidence of the work that has been done, and it shows also that it is not for lack of students that the school would fail. There were five evening and five day classes held, making a total of 360 during the year. The freehand drawing classes were attended by 28 pupils; those in mechanical drawing by 17. The day classes were attended by 46 pupils. Miss Carlyle had 20 pupils in oil, water color and life work, and Miss Burnett had 22 in china painting. A total of \$522 was collected in pupils' fees. During the year a series of lectures was given by Messrs. Angus, Yates, Sifton, Graham and Bowman. These gentlemen and many others are willing to give more extensive series next term if the school continues successfully, and other citizens have said that they were willing to give financial aid in order that it
