ELEVEN STEAMERS BUSY

Transporting Ore From the New Lines
on Lake Superior's North Shore.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 19.—The Algoma
Central Steamship Company now has
eleven steamers in operation, not in-
cluding the passenger steamers, King
Edward and Ostrifrage, which cover
the route from Toronto to the Canadian
Shore. The eleven steamers have about
as much as they can take care of in
transporting ore from the new mines
on the north shore of Lake Superior to
the lower lake ports, and on their up-
trips in carrying supplies to the vari-
ous enterprises of the allied companies
of the Algoma Central and the Cana-
dian. Another steamer will be
placed the Ostrifrage at the opening of
the season next year.

FATAL FIRE IN NEW YORK

Two Women and Three Children
Burned to Death—Child Missing.

New York, Aug. 19.—In a tenement
house fire at 35 Essex street, today,
two women and three children were
burned to death, another woman was
burned severely about the body and
face, and a man had three ribs broken
by jumping from a window to the
pavement. The bodies of the dead wo-
men were burned beyond recognition.
The injured woman is Mrs. Rosa Moses
and the name of the man who jumped
is Jacob Muscovitz. A woman named
Mrs. Hannah Balothin could not be
found after the fire and it was believed
that one of the burned bodies was hers.
Nathan Liebowitz, reported to the
police that his four children, Moses,
Louis and Sallie, respectively,
aged 2, 5, 4, and 3 years old, were missing,
and a search of the building resulted
in the finding of the badly burned bod-
ies of the two children supposed to be
Liebowitz's. The body of an elderly
woman also was found.

Entertained the Mounted Har-
bor Commissioners.

SPEECH BY HON. J. I. TARTE

Development of the St. Lawrence
Route—The National Highway—
Canada's Duty.

Montreal, Aug. 19.—The visiting rep-
resentatives of the British newspapers
expressed themselves as surprised and
delighted with what they have so far
seen of Canada. One thing that
amazed them was the rapidity with
which the Montreal Fire Brigade
turned out for an alarm. An unex-
pected call brought the reels from Guy
street to McGill College avenue, this
morning along St. Catherine street,
over half a mile, in 50 seconds. Two of
the visitors were on the reel, and
others at the alarm box with stop
watches. They were particularly in-
terested in the performance on ac-
count of the delay in the recent Lon-
don fire.

In the afternoon they were the
guests of the Montreal Harbor Com-
missioners for the purpose of seeing
for themselves the improvements and
advantages of the port. The steamer
Lord Stanley, on special. Hon. J. I.
Tarte recently made an exhaustive
amination of the St. Lawrence route,
was used, and a luncheon served to
the visitors on board. Senator Mackay,
the chairman of the board, occupied
the chair, and among the guests
were the other harbor commissioners,
most of the provincial and federal
representatives, and representatives of
the Montreal press. After the toast
of "The King" came that of "The
Government," to which the Minister of
Public Works responded.

MR. TARTE'S SPEECH.

Mr. Tarte, after a jocular reference
to the rumor that he had been made
a lord, and after expressing his thanks
for the kind words in which his health
had been proposed, said: "I have en-
deavored to do as well as I could for
my country; let me say for my hon-
or, the French-Canadian has not been
let me say to the business men
we are now on, that we are going to
continue holding it as our own. (Applause.)
Our American friends have a great
many things that perhaps we have
not, but there is one thing that we
cannot displace, cannot take from us,
with all their energy, and that is our
noble river, the St. Lawrence. It be-
longs to this great country, to the Brit-
ish Empire; here we stay. (Cheers.)
Any minister of public works should
endeavor to do as I am doing, should
endeavor to improve our great St. Law-
rence waterway. I am just back from
a trip to the great lakes that are tribu-
tary to the St. Lawrence. I am con-
vinced that today we are only begin-
ning, and that soon we will bring to
this great national highway more trade
than we will be able to handle. This is
not an occasion for making a lengthy
speech. We are improving our water-
ways. I do not wish to recriminate,
but let me say to the business men
here that we have neglected our wa-
terways in the past. We have built
railways, we have spent a lot of money
on them, and we have done well, but
we have not done for our waterways
as we should. In saying this I am
speaking of all water parties; and
all shades of well-informed public
opinion. We are afraid to navigate the
St. Lawrence at night. The St. Mary's
is a great deal more crooked, but on
one mile of that river the Americans
have more dredges than the Govern-
ment of Canada on the whole St. Law-
rence. We are not energetic. Here Mr.
Tarte made a sally that was greatly
appreciated by those familiar with the
politics of a couple of decades ago. "If

was almost cut off from telegraphic
and telephonic communication for the
24 hours ending this afternoon, when
some wires were again secured to sur-
rounding towns. They brought a story
of one of the hardest storms ever ex-
perienced in this section. Sunday af-
ternoon lightning, wind and rain work-
ed havoc all over the country around
here, except in the quadrant south-
west in Missouri. A score of towns in
Hancock and adjoining counties in
Illinois were hard hit and about 100
farm houses and barns struck by
lightning. The damage will be great.

FOUR CARS DITCHED

Guelph, Aug. 19.—There was quite a
smash on the W., G. and B. division
of the G. T. R. about 11:30 Saturday
night. A freight train had just crossed
the city limits when a crash came
which was heard in the business por-
tion of the city. A car of cement, an
empty box car and two cars contain-
ing lumber were thrown into the ditch.
Andy Dawson, a brakeman, from
Walkerton, was pitched some 30 feet
He escaped with a few scratches on the
face and several bruises on the body.
One of the cars was so badly damaged
that it was overloaded and broke down.
A wrecking crew from Stratford had
the track cleared Sunday afternoon.
Loss to the company will be considerable.

our future welfare and happiness de-
pend on the expenditure of money,"

THE LAKE TRADE.

Mr. Tarte rejoined: "I don't know
about that; at any rate I am not a
spender of money for useless purposes,
but if the demand is good we must do
our duty while we are here. The Ameri-
cans, my friends, will capture the
whole trade of the lakes, the whole
trade of the Northwest, unless we do
the right thing now. It is from that
standpoint that I have come back from
my trip, with the full determination to
bring parliament to advise the country,
with all the energy I possess, to go
right on to spend now while we are
living the money necessary to keep for
our own Canadian trade, to capture
the whole trade of the Northwest, and
some time, he no doubt will remain in
the Philippines instead of leaving on
