WAR OFFICE INCAPACITY

Shown by Conduct of Remount Department.

The Government Is Dispatching 13,000 Remounts Monthly.

London, March 4 .- The parliamentary paper on the remount department in South Africa just issued, is considered the strongest indictment of its own incapacity yet isued by the war office, and will go far to explain to the public the reasons why the war office has been so unduly protected. He soon revised this miscalculation, however, and in August was urging the government to send more horses. In the meanwhile Lord Lansdowne was equally urging the necessity to diminish the demands for animals.
