AN ANCIENT INDUSTRY

Has Come from Father to Son Since the Stone Age.

London, Aug. 10.—That there is an existence in England an industry which has descended without a break from the time of primitive man is the belief of Frederick Innis Allen, United States Commissioner of Patents, and Professor Robert T. Hill, the geologist of Washington, D. C., who recently made a visit to Brandon in Suffolk.

Mr. Allen, who came over to visit the patent offices of Great Britain, France and Germany, has made a study of inventions, and his investigations led him to devote some time to the implements of the stone age in Brandon.

Said Mr. Allen before his departure for the continent: "We found the old workshops which were worked in the stone age and ground hummocky with the traces of axes. The flint which is covered with rejected instruments. Gun flints are still made in Brandon, as well as primitive strikeflints, and I understand the former are sent to West Africa, while the larger sizes are exported to China and Korea, where they are used for flint gun barrels. Pure flint is found only in layers of chalk, and there is only one stone in America where it is met with, and that is in Texas. Flaking flint is almost a lost art, though at one time it represented the highest degree of skill known to man."

"Brandon is the only place where the flint industry is carried on in that form, and I have no doubt that what remains of the industry there has descended through generations from father to son since the stone age. Fifteen men are engaged in the work. There is no trust, for they mostly work independently and in tiny little shops. Their output is about 10,000 flints a day, and a rough calculation would indicate that several millions of people are still using the first known method of making stone tools. It is interesting to know that at Brandon is also carried on the manufacture of those so-called ancient arrow and spearheads which are sold to the unsuspecting tourist."

A British tariff on imports from the United States would raise the price of \$15,000,000 worth of breadstuffs and \$15,000,000 worth of meats. This would necessitate a tariff on \$100,000,000 worth of cotton in addition to raw materials. The cost would have to be added to her manufacturers.

Recently experiments with a view to preserving the caloric properties of hard coal by immersion in salt water were made, and it was found that a loss of 1 per cent occurred. Stored in the ordinary way coal loses about 50 per cent of its caloric power. Rain-soaked coal is said to cause boiler fires, but the effects of coal soaked in sea water yet remains to be seen.

BRITISH SPIRIT IN THE DOMINION

English Opinion of Sentiment for the Home Country.

PERSIAN IMMIGRANTS COMING

The Costigan Irish Resolution Discussed in the English House of Commons.

London, Aug. 12.—The correspondent of the Morning Post, writing from Canada, says that the chief towns of the St. Lawrence valley still depend on American cablegrams for their news of the mother country. They are colored to suit the taste of the Americans. He hopes that the press will be able to accept the offer of the Canadian Government in the direction of a subsidy. The Canadian press, he continues, is much less like the American that like the English in its tone. "The west coast has a decidedly republican political life. The Canadians look down on the Americans as being inferior in staying power. Their mood today is not one of imitation, but of rivalry."

A special Canadian correspondent of the Morning Post declares that Canadians, in spite of being long exposed to short range Yankee influence, are in no way Americanized. He declares that a strong British sentiment exists throughout old and new Canada and says the pure Britishness at Montreal seemed to him almost incredible. He adds that "British sentiment" in Canada is trustworthy, because it comes not from political fancy, but from physical and moral facts. There is no trace of feeling in Canada for annexation to the United States. Your correspondent yesterday published a strong British feeling is a real living force in Canada, and any arrangement of fiscal policy with the motherland which would be accepted by Canada would be loyally carried out."

The address of the Canadian House of Commons to the King on Irish affairs has just been published here. It provokes severe comment from the Standard, which says: "We will be surprised if King and Queen do not relish the tone of the correspondence between the Canadian Government and colonial offices. It would be ungracious to assume any malice on the part of the Irish vote in narrowly balanced constituencies affected by the judgment of the Canadian House of Commons or that the motive was anything but pure desire to promote the well-being of the motherland, but surely if colonial value the right of managing their own affairs they ought not to deny it to the people of the United Kingdom. Where the well-being of the whole empire is at stake, colonial opinion will always be invited, but the claim to provide colonial solutions for British problems cannot be allowed."

On the other hand, the publication of the address has given much satisfaction in Ireland and is favorably commented on by the Irish journals. A missionary physician of the United States mission in Persia has written to the Canadian commission to say that 200 Persians are anxious to emigrate to Canada.

According to a local story, there was seated on the beach near one of the piers a party of girls who had drifted into Atlantic City from various parts of the country and were indulging in innocent pastime of drawing pictures in the sand when a man came along selling toy balloons. One of the girls proposed they buy five, wrote notes and tied them to the balloons and let them drift away. They were not sooner suggested than done.

Each girl wrote one of those girly love letters, attached her name and invited the finder to call. They felt absolutely safe when they saw their notes and balloons drifting away to sea, and went home laughing over the episode.

Next day, much to their surprise, five young men called at the hotel and sent up cards. All the girls came down together and handed the note she had written and tied to the balloon. The young men explained they had found them, while bathing, caught fast on a post under one of the piers. DOUG WOMEN WHIPPED

Female Fanatics Start Another Religious Pilgrimage in the West.

Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 12.—Ever since the Doukhobor outbreak, a year ago, over 2,000 fanatics started off on a pilgrimage in search of Jesus, only to be called to a halt by the mounted police, run into a corral and dangled off to their cages, closely guarded. The religious excitement has been smouldering in the faraway village of the colony of this strange Russian sect.

Several times it has blazed forth in small crusades, but the presence of the police on guard and the growing influence of the more enlightened of the Doukhobors have checked a repetition of a crusade of equal magnitude. About a week ago a woman agitator named Mrs. M. J. Hooper, started to secure a following in one of the settlements behind Swan River.

Word was sent to the men at work and they followed the women to bring their backs. Words were of no avail and resort was had to force. The men used the whips they had for their horses and oxen, and the naked ranks fell in soon, broken and in nonward night.

TOWED BY BIG WHALE

Fishermen Are Given Lively Half-Hour's Ride.

Eloek Island, R. I., Aug. 12.—Representative Ted Hooper, his partner, had a lively time with a 65-foot whale seven miles southeast of Block Island in Saturday afternoon. They struck a big, fat fellow square by the whale got away, but hanging on to its tail for a few seconds the whale's back, when last seen the big fellow was going south at express train speed.

H. R. PRINCESS LOUISE

Founder of Royal Canadian Academy Will Be Represented in the Dominion Exhibition.

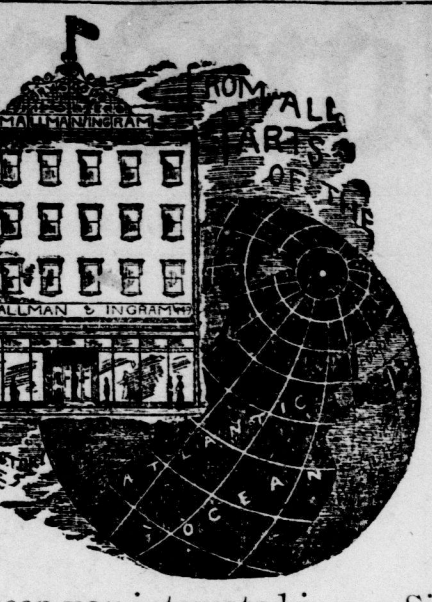
