A City In the Air.

Possibly it has never been observed but within the area of the New District is located a city distinctly its own. It might appropriately be called "A City in the Air," and it certainly establishes a precedent that undoubtedly will become a universal and permanent fixture in all building opera-

This apparently insignificant and miniature city is composed of small wooden structures, built before many buildings now in course of construction, and they are occupied by the contractors and builders who are directing the work. They are of great convenience, and are safe and comfortable to those who occupy them. They facilitate the work immensely, as they are not in the way. The vast majority of them are built over the sidewalk, and they are so arranged that it is perfectly safe for a pedestrian to walk under them. They are made strong and supported by stout posts. house itself is fitted out with all office complacently sit in his sanctum in the air and smoke his pipe while transacting business, and at the same time attend to and direct the work of the building. This has been a great item in its favor right along.

There is perfect privacy at all times. dozen or more steps lead one from the ground to the door of these small-est of houses. Windows are placed in the sides, thereby giving all the light required for the rather tedious work of working over drawings. The roof is lined with tar paper, making it waterproof, and, taking all in all, these houses are perfect dens of comfort and convenience. There is no contrast betteen these and the former "shacks" of contractors. The ones previously in use were, as a rule, placed in the street and took up a great deal of valuable space. They were also a decided inconvenience and an objection to the community. The mortar, bricks and other material necessary in building a structure had to be placed to the side of it, but with the new houses the material occupies the space of the the New District after the fire suggested these new houses, and it is hoped that the example will be followed in the future, as "The City in the Air" is a neat and attractive one

Humor in Sermons

There is no doubt that a good many sermons are dreadfully dull. But it is an element in the difficulty of preaching an element in the difficulty of preaching that clergymen, in preparing and delivering their sermons, are practically debarred from adopting some accepted oratorical means. Thus the use of humor in a service is almost unknown within the Church of England. Nonconformist preachers like the late Mr. Spurgeon have sometimes employed humor in their sermons with striking efmor in their sermons with striking effect. When he preached (if the story is true) upon the Martyrs' Memorial at Oxford, and asked where it was possible to find martyrs at the present day and and martyrs at the present day, and suggested that if the bishops and clergy of the Church of England were the martyrs they would be sure the martyrs. tyrs they would be sure to burn well, they were so dry, he resorted to a device which might or might not be allowed and approved by his own congregation, but would certainly grate upon the critical taste of churchmen. "To be amusing in the pulpit is a great crime," says Professor Mahaffy, who seems to regret that it is not open to preachers to appeal to "that peculiar human faculty, the faculty of laughter." But the use of humor in sermons is a dangerous weapon. It is more likely to create offense than to excite piety, and the clergymen of the Church of England have wisely agreed of the said losenh Andrews, who died on the said losenh Andrews. tyrs they would be sure to burn well, Church of England have wisely agreed to forego it. For where one orator poses the subtle tact of knowing when to raise a laugh and how to check it in his congregation, and of employing mer-riment in such a way as to leave no sense of incongruity. sense of incongruity or irreverence be-hind it, it is probable that ten men in the exercise of humor will do harm rather than good, and will destroy or diminish the moving power of their own exhortations.—Right Rev. Bishop Weldon, in Nineteenth Century.

French Energy in the Sahara.

Though France has an almost stationary population, and though she sends forth but few of her sons to colonize new regions of the world, she nevertheless has a colonial policy which she is carrying out with a really remarkable degree of enterprise and

In Africa her possessions are not

scattered around in fragments all over the continent, as are those of the other powers, but form for the greater part a continuous empire of over 3,000,000 square miles area. They touch the coast of Northwest Africa at half a dozen different places, and are all connected together by the great Sahara hinterland. The French Congo and the French Somali coast are the only disconnected possessions on the continent. Working from Algeria south, France has gradually established effective occupation over Figig, Igli and Tidikelt. On the Morocco border she has estab-lished a strong and orderly rule. Recently she has explored the routes between her Southern Algerian and Northeastern Sudanese posts Now she is about to take into occupation the region of Adrar, which lies in the western part of the Sahara just behind the Spanish possessions on the Atlantic Coast.
