

Appalling Traffic in Immoral Women Unearthed by the U. S. Government.

Chicago, Nov. 3. - The arrest last night of Joseph Michel, alias "Michel, the Mysterious," in connection with the Government's crusade against the white slave traffic, promises to furnish one of the most important cases in the batch of prosecutions brought by United States District Attorney Sims. Ever since the crusade began early in June, the Government has been trying to obtain evidence against the defendant. The prisoner was arraigned before United States Commissioner Mark A.
