James Jayner, employed at the locomotive works in Kingston, fell from a scaffold and had his chest crushed and a leg broken.

Hon. J. M. Gibson, the new lieutenant-governor, was busy yesterday receiving the congratulations of Hamilton organizations.

Mrs. Alfred Lebeau, of Ottawa, fell 15 feet from a window in her burning home and was caught in the arms of Fireman Frederick.

Mr. George Cook, a well-known resident of Woodstock had a severe hemorrhage of the brain yesterday, and died only a few hours.

Roy Green, of Ridgeway, was yesterday found guilty of stealing a gold watch and chain, and was sentenced to six months in the Central Jail.

George Gibbs, of Woodstock, was arrested yesterday charged with assaulting his wife. He will be held pending the result of her injuries.

A true bill has been brought against Chester Buckborough, of Tillsonburg, charged with setting fire to the Queen's Hotel in Tillsonburg last May, in which three lives were lost.

CLEARING HOUSE FOR WHITE SLAVES

Appalling Traffic in Immoral Women Unearthed by the U. S. Government.

Chicago, Nov. 3.—The arrest last night of Joseph Michel, alias "Michel, the Mysterious," in connection with the Government's crusade against the white slave traffic, promises to furnish one of the most important cases in the batch of prosecutions brought by United States District Attorney Sims. Ever since the crusade began early in June, the Government has been trying to obtain evidence against the defendant. The prisoner was arraigned before United States Commissioner Mark A. Foote, and in default of \$25,000 bail was sent to jail after a preliminary hearing.

Michel's wife, Marietta Michel, was arrested some time ago, and held to the grand jury under \$5,000 bonds. She waives a preliminary hearing, and prevented the arrest of her husband, by declaring that she was the sole owner of two houses, and that her husband was merely a bartender. The Government claims to be able to prove otherwise now.

Michel was formerly in partnership with Alphonse Dufour, who, with his wife, recently forfeited their bonds of \$5,000, and fled to Paris. However, in June, when Mr. Sims started his raids, Michel was the sole owner of the two resorts, it is said, wherein five alien women were said to have been harbored.

In some manner, Michel had been apprised of the raids, and just before the arrival of the Government detectives, it is said, he spirited the women away. The names of the women were procured and Government officers in every large city were told to be on the lookout for them.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Sims was notified by wire that the women wanted were in an eastern city, and a warrant was sworn out for Michel's arrest.

United States District Attorney Sims is now working on the theory that Michel's house was used as a clearing house for white slaves, and that they were brought from Paris to Chicago, and then sent back to New York and other eastern cities. This theory is based on the information received in the telegram asking for the arrest of Michel.

MAGUIRE ARRAIGNED

Pleads Not Guilty to Have Caused the Death of Three in Collision.

Brantford, Nov. 3.—G. T. R. Switchman Joseph Maguire, under arrest in connection with the death of London railwaymen in the Mount Vernon collision, was arraigned today. He put in a plea of not guilty, and his counsel asked for his release on the grounds that he had been exonerated by the coroner's jury's decision, which placed the blame for the accident on the company.

The magistrate reserved the case in order to consult the attorney-general's department to see whether he had power to conduct a summary hearing.

FEAR A COAL FAMINE.

Montreal, Nov. 3.—Railway men are predicting a coal famine in the west unless the dealers lay in a stock immediately. They say that the stock is very low and that if the storms tie up the traffic there will be untold suffering as there was a few years ago. The dealers say that they do not want to take the chance of carrying a huge stock, and that it is up to the railways to stock and supply them as they need it.

WEDDED WHEN DYING

A Pretty Toronto Romance That May End Happily After All.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 3.—At two o'clock in the morning, with his sweetheart not expected to live more than a few hours, Ernest Fawcett, 68 Dundas street, married to Maud Hopkins, at her mother's home, 20 Ossington avenue. The girl had been stricken with typhoid fever, and the doctor gave her but a few hours to live. It was the day set for the wedding, when Rev. J. D. Fitzpatrick was called in to administer baptism to the dying girl. It was decided to have the marriage at once, both parties being anxious for the ceremony. The marriage service was read, the girl being too weak to raise her head and scarcely able to give audible response, while friends stood around in tears. The latest report is that a change for the better has set in and Mrs. Fawcett is likely to recover.

ABRUZZI-ELKINS MIX-UP

Now Said That the Marriage May Be a Morganatic One.

Rome, Nov. 3.—Once more the rumor is current here that a marriage between the Duke of Abruzzi and Miss Katherine Elkins is only possible if Senator Elkins' family will agree that the union shall be morganatic.

A morganatic marriage would mean that Miss Elkins would have no standing in court or society, that any children she might have would not be recognized as of royal blood, and that the duke might marry one of his own caste at any time he felt so disposed.

Such wife to rank as a royal princess, having all the rights and privileges of a personage of that rank, and her children being reckoned as belonging to the royal family, the House of Savoy.

Dowager Queen Margherita's course continues to excite profound interest. She declares that she will neither meet the Duke of the Abruzzi nor communicate with him in any way until he abandons his intention to wed Miss Elkins.

The first sod of the new railway between Lampeter and Aberayron, with a probable extension to Newquay, was cut recently. The line will cost £80,000 and will be thirteen miles long.

In an election for a vacancy in the River ward of the borough of Woolwich, the Labor party nominated Miss Turnbull, a Woolwich guardian, but she was beaten by 675 to 557, Mr. G. Mitchell, Moderate, being elected.

A New York ex-prize fighter has brought suit for \$5,000 damages against a tobacco firm because the firm
