Laboratory for Extraction of Mineral by New Process.

London, Dec. 2. - Within the next few months radium will be manufactured in London. Hitherto the world has had to depend upon continental laboratories for its supply of this minute but potent element. The new factory has been constructed according to the requirements of Sir William Ramsay, who has devised a method of radium extraction which will, it is claimed, enormously reduce the time now needed for the elimination of the non-radioactive elements of pitchblende.

From the "sport" and the hardy winter wheat a hybrid was developed. This hybrid offered a partial solution to the problem. It resembled the wheat in all important characteristics, but the head covered the long hairs of the winter emmer.

Then came the task of eliminating the hairs from the hybrid, and another course of interbreeding and elimination followed. It took five years to produce the beardless grain.

As a result of his experiments, Prof. Buffum has developed nearly 70 varieties of alfalfa, and has been enabled
