BARONESS ON TRIAL

German Army Scandal Again in Court

—Accused Now Frau Weber.
Berlin, June 8. The trial of the

mer Baroness von Schonbeck, the heroine of the famous Allenstein prison murder on Christmas Day, 1901, began Monday at Allenstein. The former baroness is now the wife of A. C. Weber, the foremost satirical artist in Berlin. Frau Weber appeared in court dressed completely in black and leaning on the arm of Mr. Weber. The proceedings were in camera.

On the date mentioned Major von Schonbeck, an artillery officer, was murdered by Capt. von Goben, another

who was arrested, at first maintained his innocence, but later made a complete confession in which he implicated the baroness in the murder. A hour after making the confession Von Goben blew his brains out.

Proceedings were begun against the baroness, but her counsel set up the plea that she was mentally irresponsible and she was committed to a sanatorium. The Government, it is alleged, was not anxious that the woman should be brought to trial because of possible scandals that might

arise. For this reason she was allowed to leave the sanatorium and la-

January Berlin was surprised to hear that she had been married in London to Weber, who was regarded as a confirmed woman hater and who had been twice divorced, and once remarried to his first wife, who was a Philadelphia woman.

The murder charge was never dropped and the baroness is now on trial on the original indictment.
