Land should be taxed higher than improvements. This had been tried in many cities and was found to be workable and feasible. In Saskatchewan, it was tried and proved successful. There land is taxed at its fair market value, while improvements were taxed for 60 per cent, of their value. This had worked out well, but in 1909, at the request of the municipalities an amendment was made to the assessment act, whereby the muthe assessment act, whereby the mu-nicipalities have the power to reduce the assessment on improvements. The Legislature allows them to reduce it 15 per cent. per annum, and it was probable that in a few years, improvements would not be taxed at all. This had been tried in other places, Van-couver, New Zealand and elsewhere

couver, New Zealand and elsewhere, with perfect satisfaction.

The Fripp Bill.

Mayor Hopewell declared that the Fripp bill introduced into the Legislature last session provided that municipalities could assess improvements at a lower rate than land.
