

Very Much Alive! DISPUTES CLAIM THAT ST. PETER WAS NOT POPE

Father Mahoney Challenges Assertions Made by Rev. W. L. Armitage.

SUBMITS AUTHORITY

Claims Incontestable Proof Found in Writings of Protestant Historians.

Father A. P. Mahoney of St. Peter's Seminary, challenges certain statements of the Rev. W. L. Armitage of St. James' Anglican Church, made during the course of his sermon Sunday evening and dealing with the question of the authenticity of the claim that St. Peter was the first Pope of Rome.

Father Mahoney says: "Monday evening's edition of The London Advertiser contains the reof a sermon preached by the Rew W. L. Armitage in St. James' Church on Sunday evening and inspired by the newspaper heading-The Mantle of St. Peter Falls Upon Cardinal Ratti.' I assume that the reverend gentleman was correctly reported, at least in substance.

newspaper report credits him with the following: 'The rector stated that there is no proof that St. Peter ever was Bishop of Rome'; 'Neither sacred nor secular writings substantiate the claim that St. Peter was ever Bishop of Rome. Majority of Shops in Irish City Forced to Suspend Business.

Belfast, Feb. 14 .- Snipers continued their grim work in the disturbed sections of Belfast this morning and by mid-day the death toll since Saturday had been increased to eighteen by the deaths of two men who fell vic-tims to flying bullets in the streets ber of wounded at the same hour mately fifty.

In the main thoroughfares of the city business proceeded apparently as usual but in the storm enters the sniping was frequent and dangerous.

Belfast, Feb. 14 .- Shooting broke out again in the North Howard street area at 8 p.m. today, but no casualies have been reported. Four of the children who were

wounded in yesterday's bomb attack n Weaver street died in the hospital during the night. Twenty-two per sons were wounded by the missiles but thirteen were sent home after hospital treatment. The deaths in the disorders here since Saturday night now total sixteen.

William Waring, caretaker Orange Hall in Clifton street, headquarters of Irish Orangeism, was shot in the neck this morning and is in a serious condition.

A truckman leading a horse through Clifton street, near the scene of the Waring shooting, was stopped by a man who produced a revolver and fired point-blank at the truck driver, wounding him in the abdomen, He is in a critical condition.

The police today were again patrolling the troubled districts of the city in armored cars to forestall any serious outbreaks. The majority of the shops along
