Announcing that insanity will be the plea of Gordon Dibsdale, charged with the murder of Christine Near. his 16-year-old sweetheart, here last May, counsel for the accused asked Mr. Justice Mowat for a postponement of his client's trial in order that further mental tests may be conducted, when court opened at the fall assizes Tuesday morning. As in all defences of that kind, the defence endeavors to get the opinion of medical experts.

The killing only took place on the 31st of May last, and ever since that time Dibsdale has been in close confinement. The crown attorney died a short time ago, and Mr. Elliott was away. We applied to Acting Crown Attorney Douglas for an examination to obtain full and complete evidence as to Dibsdale's mental capacity, and the acting crown attorney would not take the responsibility of permitting an examination at the time.

"He would not consent to an ex amination at the expense of the father of the accused," continued Mr. Bartlett, "Your loardship knows how difficult it is to get satisfactory examination of the prisoner in close confinement.
