## **BRITISH VOTERS PUT CONSERVATIVES** IN POWER BY STRONGEST MAJORITY **GIVEN ANY PARTY IN LAST CENTURY**

Sweeping Political Change Puts Liberal Forces at Bottom of List.

MANY SURPRISES

Premier MacDonald, Lloyd George, Winston Churchill, Others Among Winners.

LABOR AS OPPOSITION

Many Former Canadians, Including Col. Hamilton Gault, Win Conservative Seats.

Associated Press Despatch London, Oct. 30.—The people of Great Britain have put a crushing and to their first experiment with a Labor government by returning the Conservative party to power in par-liament with one of the strongest majorities recorded during the last

In this sweeping political change the Liberal party has sunk to the weakest position it has experienced since the realignment of British political parties more than 90 years ago the time of the reform bill.
With 585 out of the 615 seats in the

House of Commons accounted for at 5 o'clock this afternoon, the Liberals had won only 40 and the Conservatives had already captured 384 and were increasing their lead constantly as the returns came in from the country districts. Labor had won 140 seats and was thus assured of being

the official opposition party in the new parliament.

Within the next hof hour, the returns showed that the Conservatives had gained more seats. Even if the Conservatives should lose all of these termining seats they would have the remaining seats they would have the largest majority in history. In fact the ultimate majority bids

foir to be the greatest the Conservative party has ever enjoyed in all its long life. Unlike the Labor government which has just fallen, the Conservatives will be able to rule as well as govern, and perhaps thus stay fixed in the governmental sad-dle for the full legal parliamentary lifetime of five years if they want to, so strong was the tide that has carried them to triumph.



## OF 2 BANKS London Financial Head Believes Further Steps Will Be Taken. CUT OVERHEAD

IN MERGER

Small Banks Suffering From Costs—Find Step Is Profitable.

There is no doubt that the merger of the Bank of Montreal and the Molsons Bank will have a strengthening effect insofar as the shareholders of the affected banks are concerned, in the opinion of a leading financier of London today.

"The idea of joining forces is good one if not carried too far. It might mean in the long run that one er two banks will be the outcome in Canada. The smaller banks are suf-fering from large overheads and smaller deposits. There is a tendency on the part of depositors to business with the larger banks,"

"The amalgamation of one of the largest banks and one of the strongest of the small ones makes a strong combination. This might cause ancombination. This might cause another pair to decide on merging to meet the competition, lower their overhead and increase their re-


