

PREMIER TO ASK STATES ABOUT POWER PROJECT

Federal Cabinet Decides To Consult Washington On Hydro Scheme.

WILL SUGGEST BOARD

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Following a meeting of the cabinet tonight, Premier King announced that a communication in regard to the St. Lawrence power project would be despatched to Washington immediately. It is expected that the attitude of the Dominion government will be set forth in a general way in this document, and that proposals for obtaining more detailed information regarding the scheme will be submitted.

While no indication was given by the premier of the attitude which the federal government will assume in connection with the plan to develop power on the St. Lawrence River, it is expected that the advisability of appointing an international board of engineers to consider all angles of the scheme will be suggested.

Since the Ferguson government assumed office in Ontario the desirability of harnessing the St. Lawrence has been urged with increasing vigor. Quite recently a large deputation representative of Ontario hydro municipalities, visited the capital and advocated federal support for the enterprise. Since that time Premier Ferguson came to Ottawa and had a conference with Premier King, at which, it is understood, that the question of St. Lawrence power development was one of the principal topics of discussion.

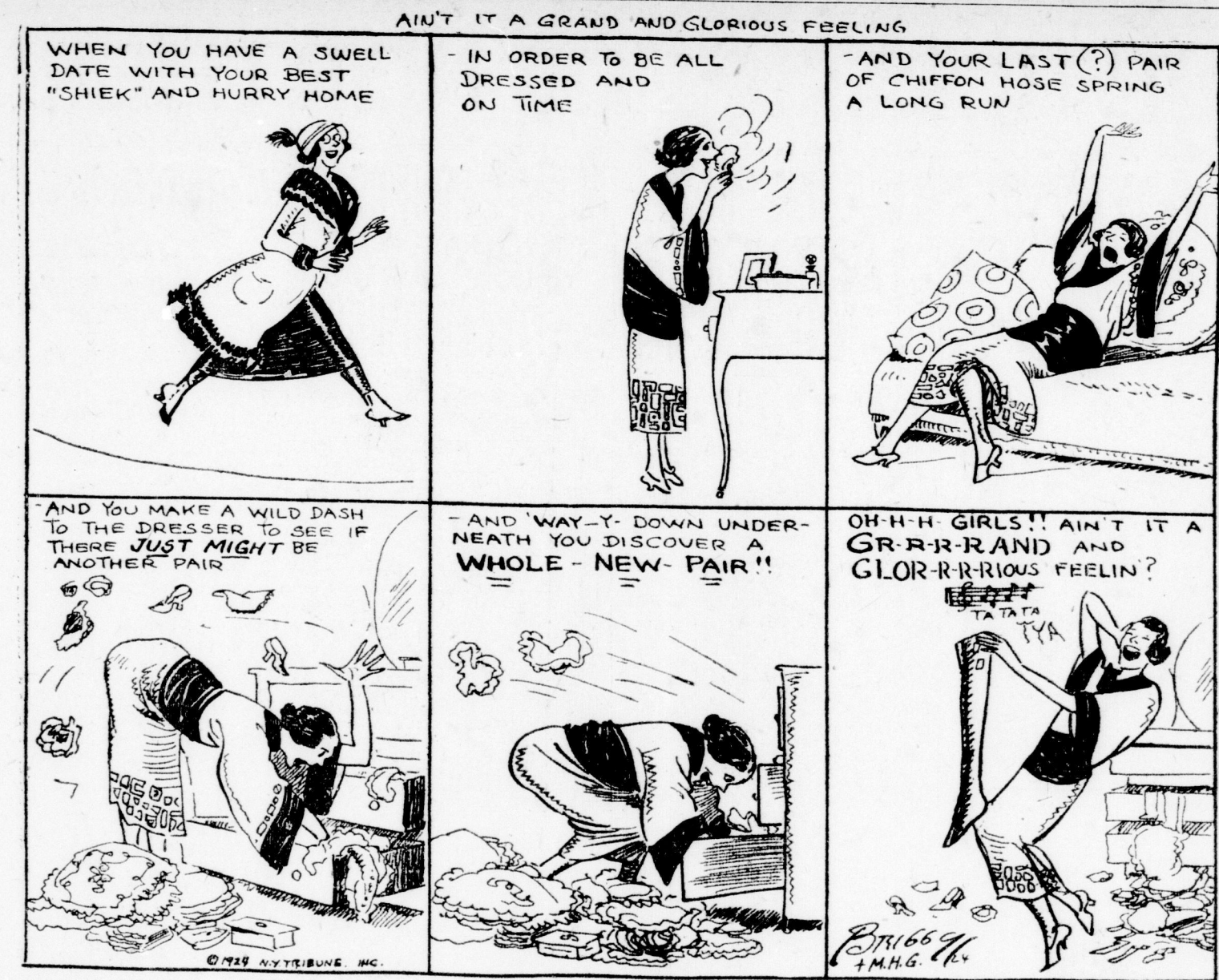

DRIVER DISMISSED ON PAYING COSTS

Magistrate Finds J. Gibling Not Travelling at Excessive Rate.

Charged with reckless driving J. Gibling in police court claimed he was going less than 20 miles an hour at the Dundas and Mainland street intersection, and was released on payment of costs.

According to eyewitnesses his driving nearly caused an accident and but for Gibling's own presence of mind a local taxi driver might have been seriously injured.

The taxi man said he was coming down Mainland street looking to the right, when Gibling's car passed him at the left. Gibling swerved in a semi-circle, while the taxi driver tried to stop. The two cars came within a degree of smashing one another.

Officers who witnessed the affair said Gibling was travelling at least 20 miles an hour.

"That does not appear to be a really excessive rate," said the court. "But it is nevertheless too fast at a dangerous intersection. I will dismiss the charge on payment of costs and witness fees."

EVICTED TENANT RETALIATES, HAILS OWNER TO COURT

Landlord Charged With Evasion of Revenue Act—\$100 Fine Asked.

CASE IS ADJOURNED

Had feeling existing between tenant and landlord resulted in the latter being brought to court this morning, charged with a breach of the war revenue act of 1915. The tenant, a local freeman, had been put out of his rented quarters. In retaliation he charged Francis Murray, his erstwhile landlord, with failure to put excise stamps on his receipts. Finally, on Aug. 1, he telephoned his landlord and notified him he would report the omission to the police unless it was rectified. Murray, therefore, returned and pasted a stamp on the receipt he had given his tenant, at the same time informing him he would have to leave the premises.

Murray desired, through his counsel, Mr. Dinsmore, that he was guilty on a mere technicality, but the court thought otherwise.

"Apparently this man would have continued evading the war revenue provision if he had not been apprehended by his own tenant," said the magistrate.

"The tenant told on him," the defence counsel said.

"If he had not told on him Mr. Murray might have continued issuing receipts without stamps. He might have gone on indefinitely. It looks to me like a serious case."

T. G. Murphy, representing the government, said he would be satisfied if a \$100 fine was imposed. Murray might be forced to pay the penalty on two charges of stamp tax evasion, but Mr. Murphy said he did not want to press the second charge.

"I would be lenient and only ask for a \$100 penalty," he said.

The court decided to adjourn the case for three days.

PENINSULAR FAIR DRAWS BIG CROWD

Championship Awards Made in Several Classes—Judges Pleased.

BUILDINGS ARE JAMMED

Chatham, Jan. 23.—Today's crowds, the interest shown in the number of exhibits in all sections, the competition between the many well-known livestock breeders, make the answer to the question whether a Peninsular Winter Fair was necessary, said W. R. Reek, manager, at the close of the second day of the first winter fair in Chatham.

From an early hour until late this afternoon crowded trains reached the city, while hundreds of autos brought many to the city. Gate receipts were far beyond the expectations of the fair officials, and a fresh supply of tickets had to be ordered.

W. H. Mancell, president Peninsular Fair Association, expressed gratification over the success of today's program.

L. H. Lennox of Ottawa, one of the corn judges, declared that the exhibits were of a far better class than he expected to find. The past season, he said, had been most unfavorable for corn, and it had surprised him to find that the exhibits were more numerous than in past exhibitions.

"There is marked improvement in the uniformity of the exhibits," he said. "The samples are more nearly the desired type than they have ever been."

IMPROVEMENT OF HIGHWAY DEMANDED OF THE COUNTY

Special to The Advertiser. Dresden, Jan. 23.—A meeting of those interested in the completion of the road between Dresden and Wabash was held here to decide what action should be taken in bringing the matter before the county council.

Last year citizens of Dresden, assisted by others along the line, undertook to build a section of cement pavement about half a mile in length from the P. M. track at Dresden to the Hasson farm, on the way to Wabash, on the understanding that when finished the government would put the remaining strip, about five miles in length, in shape. Late in the fall a little work was done on the road and some gravel laid, but it is alleged there was not a worse piece of road in Ontario during the winter season.

There is a good road from Wallaceburg to Dresden and also from Wabash to Thamesville, and the people who have spent so much in order to improve this piece of road feel that they are entitled to an outlet.

The general feeling of the meeting was that Kent County had fallen far short of securing its just dues in connection with good road construction in the province.

Reeve Holmes of Camden Township, occupied the chair. Several gentlemen were present from Wallaceburg, and were in accord that there should be a strong appeal for proper outlet to this district.

A motion was made that as large a delegation as possible should attend the county council, in session at Chatham on Thursday next, to place the claims of this part of the county for a proper highway opening to the larger centers.

NEW BUS LINE.

The new bus on the Chatham-Thamesville-Dresden route made its inaugural trip yesterday. The present schedule calls for three trips daily between the above points. The bus accommodates 16 passengers.

PURCHASER BEING NOW SOUGHT FOR RUGGLES COMPANY

J. F. Moore States Chance Good For Disposing of Plant.

REVEALS OUTPUT

The business of winding up the Ruggles Motor Truck Company is being proceeded with by the London & Western Trust Co., acting as trustees in its bankruptcy.

According to J. F. Moore, manager of the Trust Co., efforts are being made to find a suitable purchaser for the property.

"We are sending out circulars to every possible prospect in the hope of finding the right one, about a month's time we will probably advertise for bids for the property, although we do not bound any particular date."

"Is there any chance of keeping the industry for London?" asked The Advertiser.

"That I cannot say," replied Mr. Moore, "but I do know that a sale could be arranged on more favorable terms than formerly. The business was coming both for domestic and export trade, and there was no question about the good name of the Ruggles truck. The output of 1923 shows a total sale of 372 trucks. "Right now," continued Mr. Moore, "I have a cable from an Australian dealer who has placed an order for 47 trucks with the London firm. There were about 80 men, most of them employed at the plant. On business is to go about in the interests of all who have claims there but we are also interested in seeing the factory retained for London possibly."

"The original investment was \$275,000 for land, building and equipment, and in the premises now worth about \$150,000. Shipments from Canada are made on a drawback of 99 per cent on duty paid on imported material of value in the truck. It is only a few weeks ago that several trucks were sent to Chili, and there is a possibility that the export business could be expanded."
