in Favor of New York Shipments.

London, July 19.—In the House of Lords this afternoon Earl Grey (director of the British South Africa Company), brought up the question of British and American rivalry in South Africa. He complained bitterly of the discrimination in favor of New York and pointed out that, under existing circumstances, the proportion of manufacturers of foodstuffs shipped from New York to South Africa was steadily increasing. The system had given an immense stimulus to American trade, it was actually an advantage for the British shippers to send goods to South Africa by way of New York. The Barl strongly condemned the rebate system and asked the government to co-operate with the object of forming an independent shipping commission, which would secure to British shippers the advantages now enjoyed by Americans, Lord Wolverton, representing the board of trade, said he would be glad to discuss the matter with Earl Grey and see what could he done.
